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PERSONAL MESSAGE

I am taking the opportunity of the visit to the Republic of Korea of Sir Ian Gilmour to address Your Excellency on an important commercial matter.

I understand that a decision will shortly be taken on the placing of contracts by the Korea Electric Company (KECO) for the supply of two new nuclear units. I believe that the contracts for the nuclear islands for these stations may be awarded as a result of bilateral negotiations. If this is so, I hope that it will be possible to offer British engineering companies a similar opportunity to negotiate for the supply of conventional islands for these two units and that your Authorities will give full consideration to the advantages which the major British manufacturer, GEC, could offer. For over ten years it has been successfully involved with your country's power programme and has supplied over half the turbine generators installed in your nuclear power stations. GEC has unrivalled understanding of the requirements of your electricity industry, and KECO's knowledge of GEC equipment is considerable. further contract with KECO could lead to an extension of the licensing arrangements which GEC already has with Hyundai Heavy Industries, to a further transfer of technology, and to an increased share of manufacture in Korea.

These are technical advantages which speak for themselves.

KOREA - TURBINE GENERATORS

As a result mainly of significant political pressure exerted by the French, the contract for the nuclear island for the next 2 units of the Korean power programme is likely to be awarded on a negotiated basis to Framatone. HMG has been actively lobbying on behalf of GEC to assist them to secure a negotiated contract for the non nuclear island (two turbine generators valued at £100m with the possibility of four similar units later).

The Korea Electric Company (KECO) are understood to wish to put the non nuclear island out to tender but the Korean Government are concerned lest this would offend other potential suppliers, notably the UK.

GEC are, of course, well aware that the contract price will have to be competitive but they also hold the view that unless an Anglo-Korean deal can be negotiated GEC stand little chance against the US which will be offering all embracing and attractive finance tied to US suppliers for all the non nuclear equipment.

The forthcoming visits by the Korean Deputy Prime Minister, where Mr Nott will raise GEC's interest, and Sir Ian Gilmour's visit to Korea from 2-6 July will give excellent opportunities to secure the essential political approval for GEC to be permitted a negotiated contract. However we believe - and the view is supported by the FCO and the Department of Trade - that a Prime Ministerial letter to President Choi will significantly enhance the UK's chance of success.

I would therefore be grateful if the Prime Minister would consider writing to the President of Korea on the lines of enclosed draft.
