Ica Wellie,

The Prime Minister of the Republic of Korea, Mr Nam Duck-Woo, and his wife will be in Britain on a private visit from 12 to 14 September following an official tour of Sweden, Finland, Denmark and Belgium. They will be accompanied by a party of other Ministers, senior officials and press.

Despite the strictly informal nature of the visit the Lord Privy Seal attaches importance to showing the Korean Prime Minister the appropriate courtesies. We have good relations with Korea and important commercial interests there. Mr Nam, who is an economist, is generally credited with responsibility for Korea's remarkable economic and industrial progress in recent years. He is a good friend of Britain's and has visited London several times in previous ministerial capacities. We believe however that this is the first time a Korean Prime Minister has visited London.


An FCO greeter will be present at his arrival and departure and we propose that an appropriate Minister might call on Mr Nam on the morning of 14 September. We are pursuing this separately. We have explained to the Koreans that the Prime Minister herself is fully committed that morning. It would however be greatly appreciated by them if the Prime Minister were to send him a note of welcome on the lines of the enclosed draft. If the Prime Minister agrees to this, the FCO greeter might hand the message to Mr Nam on his arrival. The letter should therefore be dated 11 September.
