VISIT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA: DEFENCE SALES

In the course of her talks with President Chun this morning the Prime Minister raised the sale to Korea of the Ferranti/Marconi naval fire control system. She regarded this as a very important and significant contract. There appeared to be some problems in the way of concluding it but she hoped that these could be rapidly resolved.

President Chun said that he was not informed of the details of the contract or the precise state of the negotiations. But he could assure the Prime Minister that he would like to give her a gift because she deserved one. He would therefore ensure that we received an answer about this contract, which he hoped would be favourable, before he left London on 10 April. He would instruct Korean officials to lean over backwards to reach an agreement. He hoped the Prime Minister would issue similar instructions on the British side. The President concluded that it was the first time in his life that he had made a decision of this sort without knowing the details.

You will wish to ensure that this opening is followed up very rapidly indeed with the Korean delegation. I should be grateful if you could discuss with the Minstry of Defence and the Department of Trade and Industry, and with accompanying officials, if necessary, so that a firm conclusion can be reached tomorrow.

VISIT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA: DEFENCE SALES

The Korean Ambassador telephoned me yesterday evening about the contract for the Ferranti/Marconi naval command and control system.

The Ambassador recalled that the President had undertaken to let the Prime Minister know the outcome of his enquiries into the state of the negotiations on this contract before he left the United Kingdom. He had learned from the Korean Ministry of Defence that, as the Prime Minister herself had said, there were still a number of problems to be resolved in the negotiations. The President had therefore instructed the Minister of Defence to "proceed for a settlement". The Ambassador added that he was authorised to say that the President was optimistic about the outcome. I undertook to pass this on to the Prime Minister. I thought that she would be gratified.

You will want to ensure that this is promptly and sensibly followed up by the companies.
