YOUR TELNO 469 : PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT

SUMMARY

1. POLES ACCEPT ALL OUR REVISIONS OF PROGRAMME. TIGHT TIMING ALLOWS FOR NO SLIPPAGE. POLISH PROPOSAL THAT FROUP OF FORMER POLISH SOLDIERS RESIDENT IN UK COME FOR VISIT. NO HOPER.

DETAIL

- 2. AT FINAL MEETING WITH VICE-MINISTER KULSKI TODAY, 14 OCTOBER, POLISH SIDE ACCEPTED ALL POINTS IN YOUR TUR.
- 3. FULL DETAILS OF PROGRAMME NOW ESTABLISHED ARE IN MY IFT. THERE IS ONE FURTHER CHANGE TO PROGRAMME IN MY TELNO 586, WHICH ALLOWED, AT POLISH PROPOSAL, ONLY 15 MINUTES FOR FINAL MEETING WITH GENERAL JARUZELSKI. THIS IS OBVIOUSLY TOO SHORT AND I AGREED TODAY TO POLISH PROPOSAL THAT ONE HOUR BE SET ASIDE FOR THIS. THIS MEANS LATER DEPARTURE BUT I UNDERSTAND (TELECON HULSE-THORPE OF 14 OCTOBER) THAT THIS. CAUSES NO PROBLEMS. PROGRAMME IN IFT INCLUDES APPROXIMATE TIMINGS FOR EVENTS AFTER FINAL MEETING WITH JARUZELSKI. THIS IS OBVIOUSLY TOO SHORT. WE HAVE AGREED WITH POLES THAT 45 MINUTES BE SET ASIDE FOR THIS. WE HAVE ALSO AGREED TIMINGS FOR SUBSEQUENT EVENTS WHICH STILL ALLOW TAKE OFF AT 1945 (TELECON HULSE-THORPE OF 14 OCTOBER). POLES POINT OUT THAT TIMING IS VERY TIGHT AND ALLOWS FOR NO SLIPPAGE EG LATE ARRIVAL FROM GDANSK, LONGER TALKS WITH JARUZELSKI, OR LONGER PRESS CONFERENCE. THEY WOULD LIKE TO REDUCE TIME FOR BRITISH TV AND RADIO BUT ACCEPT THAT PRIME MINISTER ATTACHES GREAT IMPORTANCE TO THIS.
- 4. THE POLES ALSO SUGGESTED THAT THE PRIME MINISTER SHOULD HAVE A CEREMONIAL GLASS OF WINE WITH RAKOWSKI AT END OF MEDIA ENGAGEMENTS ON 4 NOVEMBER AND BEFORE DEPARTURE FOR AIRPORT. THIS WOULD ADD FURTHER 15 MINUTES. I SAID I BELIEVED THE PRIME MINISTER WOULD PREFER TO TRAVEL DIRECT TO AIRPORT AND MEET RAKOWSKI THERE. NEW TIMINGS IN ANY CASE MAKE THIS IMPERATIVE.

- 5. POLES ALSO EMPHASISED THAT CEREMONY AT SKARYSZEWSKI PARK IS UNVEILING OF MEMORIAL NOT WREATH-LAYING.
- 6. IN CONCLUSION KULSKI SUGGESTED THAT, THE POLISH GOVERNMENT WOULD BE READY TO FINANCE A VISIT BY GROUP OF POLISH EMIGRES (I.E. SOLDIERS WHO HAD LEFT POLAND IN 1939 AND FOUGHT UNDER BRITISH COMMAND DURING WAR AND WHO HAD NOT RETURNED SINCE, FOR POLITICAL REASONS, TO POLAND) FOR THE PERIOD OF THE PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT. A GROUP OF SUCH VETERANS COULD BE PRESENT AT THE WESTERPLATTE CEREMONY. POLISH GOVERNMENT WOULD SUBSEQUENTLY ORGANISE FURTHER TOURIST PROGRAMME FOR THEM NOT CONNECTED WITH PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT. KULSKI EXPLAINED THAT FOR OBVIOUS POLITICAL REASONS POLISH AUTHORITIES HAD LITTLE CONTACT WITH THOSE PEOPLE AND WOULD HAVE DIFFICULTY IDENTIFYING APPROPRIATE INDIVIDUALS. THEREFORE, HE ASKED WHETHER THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT COULD HELP IN TAKING THE INITIATIVE WITH, EG BRITISH VETERANS' ORGANISATIONS IN CONTACT WITH FORMER POLISH SOLDIERS. I SAID THIS WAS AN IMAGINATIVE IDEA BUT OUR POSITION MIGHT WELL BE TO REGARD IT AS FALLING WHOLLY WITHIN THE COMPETENCE OF THE POLISH AUTHORITIES. THIS SORT OF INITIATIVE MIGHT BE A RESULT OF THE VISIT RATHER THAN ACCOMPANYING IT.

COMMENT

- 7. IT IS SATISFYING THAT AFTER A LONG HAUL WE ARE HOME AND DRY.
 THERE MAY STILL BE SOME ARGUMENTS ABOUT THE PRIVATE PROGRAMME,
 BUT I BELIEVE WE CAN NOW HOLD THE POLES TO THE ELEMENTS AND TIMINGS
 AGREED TODAY.
- 8. KULSKI'S PROPOSAL ON VETERANS IS A BRAZEN ATTEMPT TO USE THE VISIT TO MEND FENCES WITH IMPORTANT ELEMENTS OF POLISH EMIGRE COMMUNITY IN UK. FOR US TO BECOME INVOLVED IN URGING EMIGRE POLES TO VISIT POLAND CLEARLY RISKS ENTANGLING THE VISIT UNNECESSARILY IN THIS MATTER. I RECOMMEND THAT WE SHOULD STEER WELL CLEAR OF THIS IDEA, SINCE ONLY POLISH AUTHORITIES, ON THE MERITS OF THEIR OWN POLICIES AND PERFORMANCE, CAN CREATE THE CLIMATE WHERE THOSE CONCERNED ARE WILLING TO REVISIT POLAND. I SUGGEST WE RESPOND BY SAYING THAT TIME IS SIMPLY TOO SHORT AND IN ANY CASE WE BELIEVE THIS SORT OF EVENT SHOULD COME FROM DIRECT CONTACTS BETWEEN THE HOSTS AND THOSE THEY WISH TO INVITE, WITHOUT THE INVOLVEMENT OF A THIRD PARTY.







The Chief of Protocol will invite you to take up position behind two soldiers holding the wreath. The Band will play the British national anthem. To the beating of drums you will advance in the cortege towards the Tomb. The wreath is placed on the Tomb (at 6) by the soldiers before you adjust its riband. The Band play the Polish national anthem. The Chief of Protocol invites you to sign the memorial book in front of the Tomb on the left-hand side. A page stating your title will have been prepared in advance and it will be sufficient to sign your name only. You will then be given a conducted tour of the Monument.

The Chief of Protocol invites you to move back towards the Guard of Honour and to stop before the colours, before which you bow your head. The Chief of Protocol invites you to return to your car.



The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier forms a fragment of the colonnade of the former Saxon Palace. During the Warsaw Uprising in 1944 the Palace and the surroundings of the Tomb were destroyed. After the war the only remaining fragment of the colonnade was

renovated and preserved. The plaques surrounding the Tomb commemorate the battle honours of Polish armed forces, including the Battle of Britain, Monte Cassino, Arnhem and Tobruk.

He will be accompanied by: Boleslaw Kulski, Vice-Minister of Foreign Affairs Krystyna Marszalek -Mlynczyk (MARSH-AH-WECK - MWIN-CHICK), Vice-Minister of Culture Professor Gieysztor will escort you to the Castle's small cinema for a showing of the 15-minute film in English about the war-time destruction of Warsaw and the castle and their subsequent reconstruction. After the film you will receive a 20-minute guided tour of the main rooms of the Castle accompanied by Professor Gieysztor. Depart Royal Castle by car for Hala Mirowska (5 1045 minutes' journey). Background The Royal Castle was first built as the castle of the Mazovian dukes in the 13th century. It subsequently served as the seat of the Senate and the Sejm (Farliament). After the 1944 Warsaw Uprising what remained of the Castle was systematically destroyed by the Nazis. The decision to rebuild the Castle after the war was not taken until 1971. Professor Gieysztor, who will be your quide, speaks good English. A substantial part of the collection at the Dulwich Picture Gallery was first assembled for King Stanislaw August Poniatowski, the last king of Poland who lost his throne before receiving the paintings. The Trustees of the Dulwich Gallery have agreed to lend the Royal Castle in Warsaw part of the collection for an exhibition in the Castle in 1991.

PROGRAMME NOTE NUMBER 9 HALA MIROWSKA (MARKET) WALKABOUT Procedure 1050 Arrive by car at Hala Mirowska (MEER-OFF-SKA). Today (3 November) marks the 4th anniversary of the funeral of Father Popieluszko, which took place at the church and attracted large crowds.

UNVEILING OF MEMORIAL TO RAF AIRMEN

Procedure

- O735 Depart Ambassador's Residence by car. This is your final departure from the Residence.
- Arrive Skaryszewski (SKARRY-SHEFF-SKI) Park. You will be greeted by Jerzy Boleslawski (BOLL-ESS-WAFF-SKI), President of Warsaw who will lead you to the site of the monument. Having unveiled the new memorial you will lay a poppy wreath, adjusting its riband after it has been placed by members of the Polish armed forces. Members of the official Polish Veterans Organization (ZBOWiD) and scouts will also be present. Since the commander of the crew was a member of the Royal Canadian Airforce the Polish authorities have invited the Canadian Ambassador to be present.
- 0805 Leave Park for airport by car.
- O825 Arrive airport. There will be no formal departure ceremony. Chief of Protocol, a Polish security officer and your Polish interpreter will travel on the VC10.
- 0830 VC10 takes off for Gdansk (60 minutes' journey).

Background

The uprising by Polish Underground Forces in Warsaw took place during August/September 1944. Following a plea from the Polish Government in Exile, RAF and Allied Air Forces flew many missions to drop arms and supplies to the Polish resistance. The need to make very low level drops, at night, in the face of intense German opposition, made the flights very hazardous. Between 8 August and 21 September 1944, 186 sorties were flown from bases in Italy, of which 92 were judged to have been successful, a further 63 unsuccessful, and 31 four-engined aircraft were lost. The loss rate was therefore 16.8% - three times the casualty rate over Germany.

This memorial commemorates the crew of one of three aircraft which were lost on 13/14 August from a force of 28 despatched. The aircraft was a B-24 Liberator (EV161) of No 178 Squadron RAF, which took off from Amendola, Italy, and crashed in Skaryszewski Park, Warsaw, having been hit by flak after dropping its supplies. Of the crew of seven, all but one were killed (1 Canadian, 1 South African, and 4 Britons). The dead crew members

were originally buried in the Park, but were subsequently reinterred in the British Military Section of the Cemetery at
Krakow. The only survivor was the 20 year old bomb aimer.
Sergeant Lloyd Lyne, who found himself lying on an island in the
Vistula although he had not been wearing a parachute. Seriously
injured, he was taken prisoner and survived the war. He now
farms in Cornwall and visited the crash site in Poland in 1987.
He is expected to be present at the unveiling ceremony.

During the past two years the Folish Embassy in London has located many of the airmen who flew on the supply dropping missions and has presented them with the Warsaw Uprising Cross. Small groups of ex-airmen were given their medals at receptions in London and in Edinburgh. From these meetings came the idea of forming an Association to keep these mem in touch with each other and the Warsaw '44 Club was established. The Club made its first sortie into Foland last year where they were very warmly received by all sections of the community, official and private. The Secretary of the Club is expected to be present at the ceremony.

A society in Poland known as Krakowski Klub Seniow Lotnictwa (Veteran airmen) has taken on the task of erecting Memorials to the crews of all aircraft which were shot down whilst flying supplies to Warsaw. It is they who have arranged for this memorial to be erected.

A memorial to all Allied airmen lost on these operations was dedicated in St Anne's Church, Warsaw on 1 August 1987 at a ceremony attended by the British Ambassador, the British Air Attache, and some survivors. All the crews concerned have thus been honoured.

PROGRAMME NOTE NUMBER 18 ARRIVAL AT GDANSK AIRPORT Procedure 0930 VC10 doors open. Head of Protocol, on board the plane, accompanies you down the steps and introduces the Voivod (provincial Governor) of Gdansk, Mieczyslaw Cygan (SIG-ANN), and Kazimierz Rynkowski (RIN-KOFF-SKI), President (Mayor) of Gdansk. There will be no further ceremonial at the airport. 0940 Depart by car for Westerplatte (35 minutes' journey), accompanied by the Voivod. Background The Voivod was appointed in February 1982 shortly after Martial Law. He is an army general whose career had been entirely in the professional military until his current appointment. Born in 1921 he is married with two daughters.

PROGRAMME NOTE NUMBER 19 WREATH-LAYING AT WESTERPLATTE Procedure 1015 Arrive Westerplatte by car. General Jaruzelski will greet you at the entrance to the memorial where you step out from the car. He will be accompanied by the Commander of the Gdansk Military District. General Jaruzelski will escort you on the 5 minute walk uphill towards the memorial. The paved route includes 65 steps grouped at intervals. The final approach to the monument, which is situated on a mound, involves a gentle circular ascent. 1027 Arrive on foot at site of memorial with General Jaruzelski. You bow your head to the honour guard at B on attached diagram. The British and Polish national anthems will be played. You and General Jaruzelski (at position A) will advance up the steps to the monument line abreast. Polish servicemen ahead of you will carry the wreath and place it at the foot of the monument. You adjust the riband. General Jaruzelski will then lead you around the monument (dotted line on plan), with a guide describing the main features. At position C a group of war veterans will present you with a statuette of the monument. General Jaruzelski will lead you past the honour guard to conclude the ceremony. 1040 General Jaruzelski escorts you down the payed route to the steps of the Polish naval vessel moored at F. Chief of Protocol escorts you on board.

Departure by Polish naval vessel for Greengate (30 minutes' sailing time).

Background


Westerplatte saw the first fighting between the Poles and Germans in 1939 and thus has great symbolic value. The defence was heroic, although more serious fighting was going on elsewhere.

Westerplatte is a diminutive peninsula above the bay of Gdansk at the mouth of the River Martwa Wisla (Dead Vistula). In the interwar period it was a landing point for ammunition for Poland on the territory of the Free City of Danzig (Gdansk) and was guarded by a small Polish garrison. On 1 September 1939, at 4.40 p.m. the old German battle ship Schleswig-Holstein, moored in the

ort of Danzig on a friendship visit, opened fire with its 15 inch guns on the Polish fort at Westerplatte. The army detachment of 182 soldiers under the command of Major A Sucharski held out until 7 September. In 1966 a monument, 25 metres high, was erected at Westerplatte and there is a small museum with a photomontage of the defence.

On your journey by naval vessel to Greengate you will be escorted by Mr Cygan (SIG-ANN), the Voivod and Mr Renkowski (REN-KOFF-SKI), the President. In addition an official party from Warsaw will also be present, including:

PROGRAMME NOTE NUMBER 20 WALKABOUT IN DLUGI TARG (LONG MARKET) Procedure Disembark at Greengate. You will be escorted by the 1115 Voivod, Mr Cygan, through the Greengate into Dlugi Targ (DWOO-GEE TARG), a broad pedestrian street. Walkabout to Ratusz (RAT-OOSH), Town Hall. 1135 Arrive Ratusz. Background At Dlugi Targ Kings of Poland received homage on entering the city. With the rest of Gdansk Old Town it was destroyed in 1945 and rebuilt after the war. Its fine merchants' houses originally dated from the 15th-17th centuries. The Neptune fountain, close to the Ratusz, dates from the early 17th century and is famous throughout Poland.

PROGRAMME NOTE NUMBER 21

VISIT RATUSZ (TOWN_HALL)

Procedure

- 1135 Arrive on foot at steps of Ratusz (RAT-OOSH). Mr Cygan (SIG-ANN), Voivod, and Mr Renkowski (REN-KOFF-SKI), President, will invite you up the steps into the Town Hall, which acts as a museum of the town's history.
- Your hosts will lead you on a short tour of the interior of the building, including a photographic exhibition about the war-time destruction of Gdansk and the subsequent restoration.
- Mr Cygan will escort you to the "White Room" for a courtesy meeting with the Gdansk authorities. A total attendance of some 20 people is expected. Mr Renkowski will make a short speech of welcome and will present you with a map by Jan Heweliusz (HEV-ELL-YOUSH). He will then invite you to sign the visitors' book. You make a short speech of thanks.
- 1205 Depart Ratusz by car for Hevelius Hotel (3 minutes' journey). Start of "private programme".

Background

Jan Heweliusz was a 18th century Polish astronomer from Gdansk. He produced an early map of the moon.

INTRODUCTION OF LECH WALESA

Arrive by car at Hevelius Hotel. 10 minute break in suite on 16th floor.

Leave suite for descent to meeting room.

Arrival of Lech Walesa (VAH-WHEN-SAH) with Father Jankowski (YAN-KOFF-SKI), accompanied by Janusz Onyszkiewicz (ON-ISH-KEEAY-VEECH), who will act as interpreter. A press pool will be invited for a photocall at the start of the meeting.

Depart hotel by car for Shipyard Workers' Memorial (2 minutes' journey). Walesa and Onyszkiewicz will

travel with you in the car.

Background The Shipworkers' Memorial was erected during the Solidarity period to the memory of the workers shot by police and army units in the Gdansk strikes of December 1970, which were sparked off by the announcement of heavy food price rises. The names of twentyseven who died are known. The anchors at the top of the monument are in Poland signs of redemption and struggle. The buckled surface at the base of the monument represents the fires of the rioting. The memorial is outside the gates of the Lenin Shipyard, where Walesa and others began the first strike of August 1980.





VISIT OF THE PRIME MINISTER TO POLAND

1. As a result of the reconnaissance to Poland last week, you may like to have the following comments to help with clothing requirements etc.

Climate

At present the outside temperatures in Warsaw are around 7°C (46°F) but visitors should be prepared for colder temperatures. In any event evening temperatures drop considerably. A warm coat is therefore needed for outside engagements, ie wreath laying etc. All buildings are usually well heated. Spouses will not be invited to the official dinner, so female representation may be a little sparse. (It is possible that you may also be invited). The Embassy consider it would be a compliment to the Polish hosts if the Prime Minister wore a long skirt on this occasion.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

Open square; good paving underfoot.

Royal Castle

Uneven cobblestones outside and in courtyard. Interior has new wood inlay flooring. All visitors going round at the same time as our reconnaissance were issued with felt shoe pads. However the reconnaissance team walked around with ordinary shoes and presumably the Prime Minister's party will do likewise. Fine pointed heels therefore not advisable.

Hala Mirowska

More uneven cobblestones and concrete slabs.

British Council

Two or three flights of stairs, pauses to be made to visit sites on each floor.

St Stanislaw Kostka's Church

Uneven cobbles outside.

Skaryszewski Park

Gritted path to memorial in rose garden.

Westerplatte in Gdansk

Open breezy walk from car to memorial on headland. Approximately 6 minute walk along upward circular slopes interspersed with cobbled (sometimes uneven) steps (latter approximately 65) reaching memorial. Down by same method by alternative route of steps to waiting naval vessel. Usual type of ridged gangplank.

Dugi Targ (walkabout)

Open street with 4 and 5 storey houses. Cobbled and paved areas.

Shipyard Workers' Memorial

A few cobbled steps - some uneven.

Breakfast at Residence

Fresh fruit: only apples are available on open market. Oranges, bananas etc could be bought in dollar shops or Commissariat when available. What do you think about a donation of fresh fruit to the Residence?, ie pears, grapes, tangerines etc. It might contribute towards PM's breakfast.

Malvern Water

Assume you will bring for press conferences etc.

Hair

A hairdresser known to the Embassy has been retained to comb out the Prime Minister's hair during the changing period at the Residence before the official dinner. Please confirm you will bring gas heated comb, hair spray etc.



2. Please phone me if you need any more information on this subject. The local administration arrangements will contain plans and notes on procedures for the wreath laying ceremonies. The arrival ceremony instruction will be circulated beforehand.
