

I have written to say that we could support Mr Tom Clausen as successor to Mr McNamara at the World Bank, but recommending that our reply to President Carter be delayed until after the US elections.

President Carter in fact announced Clausen's candidacy yesterday. George Schultz also confirmed in public that Clausen would have Republican support The matter will be taken at the World Bank Board on 4 November. The timing still seems very hurried. We hope that the Prime Minister can agree that the UK's representative should endorse Mr Clausen's nomination at the Board meeting if our other major partners are ready to express support for him.

The Prime Minister's reply to President Carter could follow the meeting.

I am sending a copy of this letter to John Wiggins at the Treasury.

I understand that, after considering the advice in Washington telegram No. 313, the FCO will be advising that no reply should go before the result of the US Election is known. In your letter of 24 October you asked for reactions to President Carter's proposal that Mr Clausen of the Bank of America should succeed Mr McNamara at the World Bank. The view of the Treasury and the Bank of England was given in John Wiggins's letter of today's date.

I have not yet consulted the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary. However Mr Marten and FCO officials see no objection to Mr Clausen: though we think it would be awkward to endorse a candidate put forward by President Carter so soon before the Presidential elections, even though we have no reason to doubt that Mr Clausen would have bipartisan support. We would prefer that any reply be delayed until after the elections; I gather that the Germans are doing the same.

I am copying this letter to John Wiggins, the Private Secretary to the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

PRESIDENT OF THE WORLD BANK

You asked for an early assessment of Mr A.W. Clausen's suitability for appointment as President of the World Bank.

The judgment jointly reached by the Treasury and the Bank of England is that Mr Clausen is likely to have the right combination of management experience, toughness and financial expertise for the job. He should command the confidence of the American capital markets in which the World Bank has to borrow. The Chancellor and the Governor would therefore be content to accept the nomination of Mr Clausen.

ON YOUR FIRST QUESTION, I HAVE SPOKEN TO COLBERT KING (US EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR), WHO CONFIRMED THAT CLAUSEN'S CANDIDACY HAD BEEN CLEARED WITH THE APPROPRIATE PEOPLE ON THE REAGAN SIDE. ALTHOUGH HE DID NOT KNOW HIMSELF WHETHER IT HAD GONE TO REAGAN PERSONALLY, HE ALSO UNDERSTOOD THAT CLAUSEN WAS A REGISTERED REPUBLICAN. I HAVE ALSO SPOKEN TO MCNAMARA, WHO SAID THAT HE HAD NOT BEEN IN TOUCH WITH REAGAN HIMSELF, BUT HAD BEEN ASSURED THAT THE NOMINATION HAD BEEN CLEARED WITH REAGAN. AS ANY AUTHORITATIVE REAGAN SPOKESMEN WILL BE ON CAMPAIGN TRAIL BETWEEN NOW AND THE ELECTION, I THINK THIS IS PROBABLY AS MUCH ASSURANCE AS ONE CAN GET AT THIS STAGE. 2. ON THE FACE OF IT, THERE SEEMS NO REASON WHY CLAUSEN, WITH HIS BANKING BACKGROUND, SHOULD NOT BE ACCEPTABLE TO A FUTURE REPUBLICAN ADMINISTRATION UNLESS THEY HAD WANTED TO NAME ONE OF THEIR OWN POLITICAL SUPPORTERS. IF THEY HAD, HOWEVER, THEY WOULD PRESUMABLY HAVE REFUSED TO CLEAR ANY CANDIDATE AT THIS STAGE. 3. ON THE SECOND QUESTION, I ASSUME THAT THERE WOULD BE NO DIFFICULTY IN US FINANCIAL CIRCLES, AS REGARDS THE WORLD BANK. KING TOLD ME THAT THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE HAD ONLY GONE TO A FEW CLOSE ALLIES, BUT THAT MILLER HAD ALSO TAKEN SOUNDINGS OF SOME DEVELOPING COUNTRIES, AND KING WAS NOT AWARE OF ANY ADVERSE REACTION.

A NUMBER OF NAMES (BOTH AMERICAN AND NON-AMERICAN) AND THAT.

CLAUSEN HAD BEEN AMONG HIS SHORTLIST. IN HIS VIEW, CLAUSEN WAS

WELL REGARDED BOTH AS AN ABLE BANKER AND AS A SUCCESSFUL MANAGER

OF A VERY LARGE BANK. AT THE SAME TIME HE HAD A REPUTATION FOR

BEING SOCIALLY SENSITIVE IN A WAY WHICH SOME OTHER ABLE US

BANKERS HAD NOT. WHILE CLAUSEN HAD NOT THE SAME OVERT LINK WITH

DEVELOPMENT MATTERS AS SOMEONE LIKE PETER PETERSON, MCNAMARA

COMMENTED THAT PETERSON HAD NOT BEEN PARTICULARLY IDENTIFIED

WITH THIS FIELD UNTIL HE (MCNAMARA) HAD SUGGESTED HIS NAME TO

BRANDT. THE BANK OF AMERICA OPERATED IN ABOUT 100 COUNTRIES AND

A LARGE PART OF ITS PROFIT CAME FROM INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS.

IT HAD A GOOD REPUTATION IN DEVELOPING COUNTRIES WHERE CLAUSEN

PERSONALLY WAS WELL KNOWN (ESPECIALLY E.G., BRAZIL, MEXICO,

INDONESIA) — PROBABLY BETTER KNOWN THAN PETERSON.

5. MCNAMARA FELT THEREFORE THAT CLAUSEN'S NAME WOULD BE WELL RECEIVED IN THE WORLD BANK BECAUSE OF THE WIDE RECOGNITION NOW THAT THE BIGGEST PROBLEM FACING THE WORLD BANK IN THE 1980'S WOULD BE RAISING THE MONEY TO FULFIL ITS GROWING ROLE. HE ALSO UNDERSTOOD THAT CLAUSEN WOULD BE WILLING TO SERVE IF ASKED. MCNAMARA'S ONLY HESITATION WAS WHETHER CLAUSEN, AFTER HEADING THE BANK OF AMERICA, MIGHT BE IRKED BY THE GREATER FRUSTRATION IN GETTING THINGS DONE AT THE WORLD BANK. BUT HE BELIEVED THAT HE WOULD COPE WITH THIS, AND FIND THE JOB FULFILLING, AS HE HIMSELF HAD DONE.

6. MY OWN FEELING IS THAT, SIMPLY LOOKING AT HIS BIOGRAPHY, SOME PEOPLE MIGHT WONDER HOW CLAUSEN MATCHED UP TO THE SPECIFICATION INFORMALLY PREPARED BY EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS (COPIED TO ODA AND TREASURY) WHICH GAVE HIGH PRIORITY TO A . COMMITMENT TO INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND SOCIAL PROGRESS. THAT WAS, FOR EXAMPLE, THE SNAP REACTION OF MY GERMAN COLLEAGUE, HOWEVER, THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES HAVE NOT TAKEN A HIGH PROFILE HERE ON THIS MATTER, OR HURRIED TO PUT FORWARD A CANDIDATE OF THEIR OWN: AND THEY SEEM, LIKE US, TO HAVE BEEN CONTENT TO AWAIT A US PROPOSAL, THEY MIGHT WELL OBJECT IF A CANDIDATE WERE PUT FORWARD WHO WAS NOT TECHNICALLY COMPETENT OR SEEMED TO BE A POLITICAL PLACEMAN, BUT CLAUSEN DOES NOT SEEM OPEN TO OBJECTION ON EITHER OF THESE COUNTS. MCNAMARA'S SUPPORT IS OBVIOUSLY ALSO IMPORTANT, THERE SEEMS A REASONABLE CHANCE THEREFORE THAT THE NOMINATION WILL GET A FAVOURABLE RECEPTION. (IF YOU WANT TO DOUBLE-CHECK ON THIS, ONE WAY WOULD BE TO MAKE SOME VERY DISCREET INQUIRIES OF A LEADING DEVELOPING COUNTRY, E.G. IN NEW DELHI).

7. AS REGARDS THE TIMING OF YOUR REPLY, THE APPOINTMENT HAS TO TE MADE BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, AND THAT CLEARLY CANNOT NOW APPEN UNTIL AFTER THE ELECTION. I GATHER FROM KING THAT THE ADMINISTRATION WOULD LIKE TO MAKE PROGRESS SO AS TO FACILITATE CONTINUITY, AND THAT EVEN IF REAGAN WINS, IT WOULD BE POSSIBLE FOR A NOMINATION TO GO FORWARD WITH HIS ENDORSEMENT DURING THE ''LAME DUCK'' PERIOD. BUT I DO NOT SEE WHY YOU SHOULD NOT HOLD UP YOUR REPLY UNTIL AFTER THE ELECTION, IF THE GERMANS ARE GOING TO DO THE SAME. I WILL LET YOU KNOW IF I DETECT ANY EVIDENCE OF PRESSURE TO MOVE FASTER.

8. FCO PLEASE ADVANCE TO PRESTON (ODA), COUZENS (TREASURY) AND PS/GOVERNOR (BANK OF ENGLAND).
