BICENTENARY OF THE FRENCH REVOLUTION

Thank you for your letter of 26 June about the detailed arrangements for the Prime Minister's participation in the celebrations of the Bicentenary of the French Revolution.

Bilateral Meetings

I am content with the suggestions you make, in particular that we should try to deal with some of the requests by arranging for the Prime Minister to sit next to the people concerned at a bicentenary lunch or dinner. I do not think the Prime Minister would in any case want a separate meeting with President Ershad. My only comment is that she might blanch a bit at breakfast with President Uno. Would it not be possible to breakfast with President Bush or President Salinas?

I do not think the Prime Minister will want her bilaterals to take place at the Elysée but at the British Embassy.

Arrival in Paris

I agree that we should tell the French that the Prime Minister cannot get to Paris before 1145. You should point out that we have moved heaven and earth to get her to Paris in time for the Trocadero Ceremony on 13 July. If it would help I would be perfectly happy to speak to the head of protocol at the Elysée with whom I have a number of contacts.

Social Interpretation

The simple rule of thumb is that the French will have to provide interpretation wherever they are seating the Prime Minister next to a guest who does not speak English. I am astonished that the French suggest we should pay for this. Are we expected to help defray the costs of the meals as well? At the least it seems likely to give the Treasury ideas for our own practice.

As President Bush will attend the Trocadero Ceremony we are planning on the Prime Minister doing so too. Bilateral Meetings I attach an up-to-date list of participants in the bicentenary. The Bangladeshis and Uruguayans have now also bid for bilateral meetings with the Prime Minister. (I have already written to you separately about the Uruguayan President.) Programme pressures mean that a formal bilateral with Mubarak (my letter of 15 June) will not be possible: we thus do not see scope for adding even more to the list. However, the Prime Minister will attend three Bicentenary meals and we could ask the French to arrange for her to be seated next to Mubarak and Sanguinetti. Would the Prime Minister like us to try to fix the placement in this way? Ershad is very keen to see her, no doubt in connection with flood control measures but we see no strong case for a meeting and believe that a brief talk in the margins would suffice eg at a reception. There should be opportunities for such ad hoc meetings eg at the 14 July Garden Party.

A programme for the meetings with Presidents Bush, Aquino, Salínas and Messrs Gandhi and Uno might look as follows (the full programme is annexed for ease of reference):

The French are urging that all bilaterals - whether or not involving the French - should take place at the Elysée to minimise VIP transfers. This would be convenient and save time but has other disadvantages. Should we assume that the Prime Minister would prefer her bilateral meetings in the British Embassy or (with President Bush) in the US Embassy next door? The 14 July breakfast with Mr Gandhi is of course already arranged for the Embassy.

Arrival in Paris

The French are expecting guests to arrive at the Trocadero in inverse protocol order. This would require a long wait for the Prime Minister: we therefore intend to suggest to the French that she should arrive at 1145 (they may however argue strongly for an earlier arrival). On this basis, RAF VC 10 flight timings could be as follows:

ETD LHR Southside 0850 hours (Flying time: 1 hour 25 mins)

ETA Orly 1115 hours (UK on GMT + 1; Paris on GMT + 2 hours)

Would you be content with this?

HM Ambassador will meet the aircraft at Orly to introduce the Prime Minister to a Member of the French Government waiting on the tarmac. At Orly there will be a Guard of Honour along the red carpet leading to the Pavilion d'honneur. No military inspection and no anthems are planned. A pool of journalists will be present. The Ministerial party will reach the waiting car convoy after traversing the Pavilion d'honneur. This arrival ceremony should only take 5 minutes. The journey into Paris by road with a motorcycle escort is estimated at 25 minutes.

Social Interpretation

The French authorities have told us they are not proposing to provide interpreters during meals unless specifically requested. If the French are not able to confirm

/that



that they will be able to arrange our seating requests, placement for meals will probably not be available until the eleventh hour, so it is not possible to predict precisely what may be needed.

During the last couple of years, the floor language for social events at Economic Summits has been English. There is likely to be more French spoken in Paris.

Are you content that we ask the French to provide whispered interpretation at meals as necessary? We understand that we shall be required to pay for such services. We shall write separately about any necessary interpretation for the Prime Minister's bilateral meetings as soon as requirements are clarified.
