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The Defence Secretary has kept Mr O'Neill and Mr Campbell regularly in touch during the force deployments to the Gulf and we divide have got into the habit of letting them know in advance of announcements (eg in the last week on Reservists and Biological Warfare vaccinations). This has generally been followed by helpful and supportive comments to the press. He would, accordingly, plan to continue with such briefings; although neither are Privy Councillers they readily accept confidences and we have not had any with difficulties on this score. Mr King also gave a military briefing in November to Mr Ashdown and Sir David Steel on Privy Council terms.

Against this background, it occurs to the Defence Secretary Within that if there is sufficient military content in the Prime Minister's briefings for Mr Kinnock and Mr Ashdown, it might be sensible if he was to join the Prime Minister and for Messrs O'Neill and Campbell to be invited too. Indeed, a three to three briefing including the Foreign Secretary might be helpful and economical in time.

Separately, the Defence Secretary is ready to brief Mr David Howell and Mr Michael Mates, and would also plan to speak to Sir Geoffrey Johnson-Smith.

As for timing, with a debate on the 15th in prospect, we would have it in mind to brief slightly ahead so that we can cover areas that would not be appropriate to go over on the floor of the House.
