US REQUEST FOR AN AIRCRAFT CARRIER FOR THE RED SEA

The Chief Secretary has seen your Minister's minute of 3 January and also Charles Powell's letter of 4 January listing a number of points on which the Prime Minister has asked for clarification.

- 2. The Chief Secretary shares the Prime Minister's scepticism over the case for this deployment. You will recall that, in paragraph 12b of his minute of 20 November on Gulf reinforcement options, Mr King warned of this possible approach but said that he was not then persuaded of the case. He went on to argue that "Maritime Operations is one area where other Allies can make substantial contributions and do more. I am also mindful that, while we must be prepared to pay our share of the cost of defeating this aggression, it will be very expensive and if this is an area where Allies can contribute they should be urged to do so."
- 3. If it is the case that the possibility of pressing our European Allies has not been pursued in the meantime, the Chief Secretary infers that the proposed deployment is not of the highest priority and that we should not be bounced into conceding it now. Presumably if the UK, or other European allies, were unable to make a contribution the Americans could still cope, either by retaining an aircraft carrier or as suggested in Charles Powell's letter using a smaller vessel.
- 4. I am copying this letter to Charles Powell, to the Private Secretaries to Members of OPDG, and to Sir Robin Butler.
