Thank you for your letter of 10 March reporting your conversation with Daniel Dultzin of the Mexican Embassy.

I should have told you before now that the question of a meeting between Sherpas and representatives of major debtors did indeed arise, briefly, at a Sherpa meal. Jacques Attali said that he had been invited to visit Mexico, I think in May, for a discussion with representatives of the major debtor countries. He was vague on details, but thought that the meeting concerned might be similar to one he had attended last This had been attended by government officials and by outsiders, such as academics. None of my Sherpa colleagues showed any interest in attending.

I am sure you are right to tell Dultzin that many countries and groups express their views on economic issues to the Summit leaders before their annual meetings.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Geoffrey Littler.
