I am content with your proposal to require educational establishments to give the registration officer a list of students on full-time courses and their addresses, where known, at the start of each academic year, and to respond to requests for information at other times. This seems to be equivalent to the duty imposed on the responsible person at each address, except that colleges will not be required to notify any change of address

of their students. In view of the difficulty of keeping track of the addresses of students in lodgings, I am sure that this is the right approach.

I do, however, see the force of Malcolm and Kenneth's arguments over the payment of the charge in 3 instalments. I do not think we want to imply that students are more likely than other groups to attempt to evade their liability, and nor should we leave them as the only group without freedom to alter their payment schedule, in consultation with the local authority, to suit their circumstances. Those wholly dependent on grant may well find it more convenient to pay at the time their cheque arrives, but many who depend wholly or in part on parental contribution may receive a monthly income, and find the 6 month instalment in particular a serious financial burden.

These arrangements would, of course, be made in regulations. I would need to consider the matter very carefully before implementing this particular proposal in Wales.
