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LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCE: FEES AND CHARGES

I have seen a copy of your letter of 28 March to the Chief Secretary recommending that the provisions to widen the charging powers of local authorities should not be introduced into the Local Government Finance Bill.

As you know, I published my Green Paper "Financing our Public Library Service" on the assumption that the necessary enabling legislation would be in place this Autumn. The delay will cause me some embarrassment and will enable the librarians, who are strongly opposed to some of my proposals to extend library charging powers, to strengthen their position. It will also mean a loss of the impetus behind my initiative and a loss of interest outside the library profession in the scope for developing the public library service through the changes I have proposed.

I recognize your difficulties and must accept your judgement on this. I can only record my disappointment at the delay and try to minimize the damage. It will be very important to present this decision to the public in as positive a way as possible, perhaps with a firm commitment to legislate next Session.

## LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCE BILL: FEES AND CHARGES

I have seen a copy of Richard Luce's letter to you of 11 April in response to your letter of 28 March to John Major in which you sought colleagues' agreement that the provisions on fees and charges which it had originally been intended to include in the Local Government Finance Bill should instead be held over until the Housing and Local Government Bill planned for next Session.

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While I am entirely content for these clauses to be deferred until next Session, I cannot agree to Richard's suggestion that you should give a commitment to introduce the provision next Session. An undertaking of that nature would, of course, fly in the face of the convention that we do not commit ourselves to the introduction of legislation in a particular Session ahead of the Queen's Speech. I should be grateful, therefore, if you could avoid going beyond saying that the necessary clauses will be introduced at the next convenient legislative opportunity, or words to that effect.
