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RATE SUPPORT GRANT BILL

The Cabinet agreed on 7 July that we should introduce a short Bill to close down the existing Rate Support Grant system, and asked me to consult you and others about the timing.

From my point of view, there is much to be said for legislating before the Rate Support Grant Settlement for 1989/90 (which on the normal timetable will be made in late November or December) since this will avoid a number of technical difficulties. I would therefore much prefer to legislate during the current session rather than at the start of the new one. I understand that the Parliamentary timetable would just allow a Bill to be passed during the spill-over period, and indeed this course would have some advantages for you. I therefore suggest that we should aim to introduce the Bill as soon as the House returns after the Summer Recess. We will instruct Parliamentary Counsel as to the contents at the end of this month.

I am sending copies of this to members of QL, to Peter Walker, John Major, Sir Patrick Mayhew and Sir Robin Butler.

In all the circumstances, there might well be advantages from a business management viewpoint in taking the Bill through all its stages during the overspill rather than at the beginning of next session's very crowded programme and I am content, therefore, with this approach provided, of course, that the Bill is introduced as soon as the Commons return after the recess. I understand that colleagues to whom you copied your letter were also content and you may accordingly take it that you have QL's authority to introduce the Bill at the beginning of the overspill. Your officials have explained to mine that you will need to make known the timetable at a meeting with the local authority associations on Tuesday of next week. In the light of that, I can confirm that I would be content for you to announce this in the Hosue of Commons early this week in response to an arranged Question.
