We have recently become aware of certain inadequacies in the Audit Commission's powers to arrange for the certification of grant claims and other financial returns by local authorities. It is very important for us and other Departments involved that all the claims and returns are properly checked and independently certified. Without such certification we could not be confident in the returns and claims nor could Departmental Accounting Officers defend to Parliament the regularity and propriety of payments based on them. We believe the most effective way of securing proper independent certification is for it to be arranged by the Commission. Accordingly, subject to colleagues agreement, and provided it is within scope, I propose to take a provision in the Local Government and Housing Bill to seek to widen the Commission's powers in this area.

At present the Commission's powers to undertake certification work, at the request of local authorities, are restricted to the certification of claims and returns in respect of grants or subsidies paid by Ministers and accounts submitted to Ministers for payment. We are currently aware of three areas where this formulation will not be wide enough to enable the Commission to arrange certification.

Firstly, from 1 April this year the Housing Corporation will be authorised to pay Housing Association Grant. At present the Commission does not have the power to certify local authority claims in respect of grants paid by the Corporation for local authority sponsored schemes, as the grants would not be paid by a Minister of the Crown.

Secondly, under the proposed new capital finance system a provision, to which colleagues have given approval, and which we will be seeking to include by amendment in Part IV of the Bill, will give me broad powers to require financial information from local authorities and that the information be certified by the

Chief Finance Officer or auditor. Much of this information does not relate to expenditure supported by grant and subsidy and its certification would not therefore come within the Commission's current powers.

Thirdly, the Department of Education and Science, who administer the Teachers' Superannuation Scheme, are considering in future requiring all Local Education Authorities to submit certified returns of their collection and remittance of contributions to the Scheme. Once again such certification would be outside the Commission's present powers as the contributions do not relate to grant or subsidy.

I therefore propose to amend the provisions of section 29(1) of the Local Government Finance Act 1982 so as to widen the Commission's enabling powers to allow them to arrange certification of any claims or returns relating to the accounts of a local authority if asked to do so by the authority. The Commission would, as now, be required to charge the local authority the full cost of providing such services. We have consulted the Commission on this who consider that the proposed formulation would cover all foreseeable demands and have said that they would welcome an early amendment.

I do not believe that this will be a difficult or controversial amendment though I do consider it is a very necessary one. Provided it is within scope of the Local Government and Housing Bill (and we already have a provision in the Bill extending the functions of the Audit Commission) I would propose to take this as an amendment to that Bill. I hope colleagues will agree that this should go forward and give their consent to drafting approval.



We too would like to add our support to these proposals, since it is agreed that it is vital for proper, independent checks to be carried out on the information supplied to us by local authorities, and that the Audit Commission is the ideal body for arranging such checks. In keeping with our previous approach and the decisions taken by your Department, we have used the NEC's public sector status in order to secure substantial ERDF funding for its development. This also applies to the International Convention Centre which is being built in an inner city area in Birmingham by the NEC company. I have recently been pressing the new Commission not to reduce the level of ERDF receipts to the UK. Neither my Department nor, I believe, yours has been able to determine how, or even whether, such ERDF funding could be protected if the NEC were to be privatised.

It is not clear from your letter whether, in opening negotiations with Birmingham City Council, you would have in mind a specific timetable by which you would expect the NEC to have moved into the private sector or merely that you would expect to conclude such negotiations within an agreed timetable. My concern is that I do not think we are yet in a position to propose a timetable which we could be confident would prove realistic. I should welcome your further comments on this. Similarly, I would have some reservations about opening negotiations if we were not clear precisely what we hoped to achieve as an end result. If you would find it helpful I would be pleased to ask my officials to discuss these matters urgently with yours.

Finally, I notice that, perhaps in view of the urgency, you have not copied your letter widely. There are, however, some colleagues such as Norman Fowler who I believe would have a clear interest. I would hope you will be able to consult them in any further correspondence.
