
spoods subject to he view PRIME MINISTER You will know that I am preparing amendments to the Local Government and Housing Bill for several purposes connected with the community charge, the pooling of the Unified Business Rate and the new Revenue Support Grant systems. I would now like your policy agreement and drafting clearance for a further small addition which would: a. enable me to demand information from Community Charge Registration Officers (CCRO) for central Government purposes other than those directly connected with the 1988 Act, and for the CCRO to be under a duty to provide this information; and b. enable (but not compel) CCROs to release data on the register to other persons. Both measures would be subject to the proviso that no information is to be released which reveals anything about individuals. The provision is concerned with statistical information. I understand that registers are regarded by OPCS as a potentially invaluable source for the improvement of population estimates and projections and I see it as useful for monitoring the housing market. Local government want access mainly for planning and research purposes. Without the new measures my power to demand statistical information is insecure, and CCROs have no power to release statistics to officials in their own or other authorities I have consulted the local authority associations and I expect no opposition to the measure. I am copying this minute to other members of E(LA), to John Wakeham and to Sir Robin Butler. It would be helpful to have comments by 19 May. I am writing to support your proposed addition to the Local Government and Housing Bill, which would:

a. enable you to demand information from Community Charge Registration Officers (CCRO's) for central government purpose other than those directly connected with the 1988 Act, and for CCRO's to be under a duty to provide this information; and

b. enable (but not compel) CCRO's to release data on the register to other persons.

The aggregated statistical information obtainable from CCRO's is potentially very useful to OPCS for preparation of local population estimates and projections. The OPCS figures are used extensively for distribution of resources among both local and health authorities, and any improvement of them will result in better targeting of expenditure.
