NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE BILL

WILL KGOVEST IG-KGO VIKED I wrote to John Wakeham earlier in the year explaining the need for early Royal Assent to this Bill if our reforms of the Health Service are to be implemented to timetable. I was most grateful for his assurance that the business managers would use their best endeavours to ensure that the Bill reached the statute book as soon as possible and by the summer recess at the latest. I remain of the view though, that if we are to achieve successful implementation we need early Royal Assent. I would therefore still like to aim for April (of if necessary May) 1990.

Thanks to excellent service from Parliamentary Counsel, we now have a first draft of the main elements of the Bill. I am also grateful for the help which the Chancellor's officials and those of territorial colleagues have offered in the course of preparing legislation and look for this to continue in the coming months.

My officials will be offering Counsel instructions in the two outstanding areas shortly and I should therefore be able to come to Legislation Committee with a draft at the beginning of November.

I believe that we should aim for the earliest possible introduction. Second reading very early in the session would demonstrate publicly the Government's commitment to maintaining rapid progress with its plans and would also help to establish the necessary momentum if we are to keep to the demanding Parliamentary timetable for the first half of 1990.

The comparative brevity of the Bill, when compared to the major measures of the last two sessions, should serve to reduce some of the pressure on this timetable. Even so we can expect the Bill to be subject to heavy opposition amendment.
