Worst scenes at Bristol where some 20 arrested and 5 police injured.

Mirror puts toll at 46 arrests; 5 injured policemen.

Other demos at House of Lords (nude girl, drunk), Reading, Norwich, Exeter, Dover, Wokingham, Derwentside, Weston Super Mare, Gillingham, Worcester, Birmingham, Maidenhead, Bradford. <u>Today</u> says there were 13 riots.

Queen, Prince Charles and Princess Anne to pay their own estate workers' charges.

Liverpool councillors run up £4,000 bill on sexy chatlines.

You say high community charges are a rip off (\underline{Today}) . Labour are high spenders.

<u>Mail</u> says the organisation co-ordinating community charge protests is dominated by Militant supporters.

With the evidence emerging of Militant involvement in orchestrating the demonstrations, the Labour Party moved swiftly last night to denounce violence, recognising that it would divert attention from the Govt's problems over the tax (Times).

In a separate story under the heading "How the disruption is organised" a <u>Times</u> investigation reports that Militant, the hard-Left Trotskyite group, have come to dominate the 1,500 branches of the All Britain Anti-Poll Tax Federation, provoking confrontation with police.

<u>Independent</u> says spiralling costs for small businesses in your constituency - business rate, community charge, interest rates cause Tory voters to warn of possible desertion to Labour.

Kohl climbs down over Polish border and reparations. He did so to save coalition. <u>Express</u>: He says mistakes have been made on all sides - "including by me".

<u>Independent</u> describes it as a humiliating defeat for Kohl. Gorbachev gives strongest warning yet of Soviet hostility to NATO membership for unified Germany.

<u>Times</u> leader says that having damaged his own and his country's good name by his mishandling of the German-Polish border question, Chancellor Kohl has for the moment yielded to wiser counsel from inside his party. This was a defeat, but not a rout for Kohl. It concludes that tone-deaf to diplomatic harmonies as he is, Kohl was never likely to resolve the discord between Bonn and Warsaw over the border. Yet his duty to his country demands nothing less.

Mail feature describes Kohl as the loose cannon on Europe's deck.

Peregrine Worsthorne, in <u>Telegraph</u>, says everyone is now coming round to your view about the dangers of a united Germany. Even the French are summoning up the courage to say so publicly. It would be nice to think that those who criticised you for your stance would now withdraw.

Poland demands £175billion compensation for 13million Poles who suffered under Nazis.

Britain's Ambassador to Paris delivers a strong plea for closer co-operation between Britain and France in areas of vital mutual concern (Times).

Russia opens door to private ownership of land and property.

Lithuania plans to declare independence on Monday unless Gorbachev guarantees their right to self-determination (\underline{FT}) .

Army coup led by Defence Minister collapses in Afghanistan.

But skirmishes continue in Kabul despite Afghan govt claims that coup has failed according to Independent.

Mandela gives strong hint that ANC would be prepared to give constitutional guarantees to whites in South Africa to appease their fears that they would be overwhelmed by the country's black majority (Times).

South African Defence Minister Malan stares political ruin in the face as it becomes clear he was either incompetent or involved in death squads (Independent).

De Beers to move its overseas interests to a Swiss registered company in a move apparently intended as a hedge against nationalisation in South Africa (\underline{FT}) .

Anti-Apartheid movement tell Douglas Hurd that Britain's policy to South Africa could "abort" the prospect of a negotiated end to apartheid (\underline{FT}).

With the Govt under continuing attack over the economy and the community charge, Michael Heseltine rallies Conservative MPs with a Commons speech attacking Labour's alternative policies (<u>Times</u>).

General Motors to site a new Euro engine plant at Ellesmere Port, according to reports from Geneva Motor Show - will create 400 jobs.

Nissan in an outspoken attack has warned the EC against attempts to maintain barriers against Japanese cars (FT).

 \underline{FT} leader on EC car battles, says the growing interdependence of international markets and the global expansion of industry may not reduce the immediate political pressures on Brussels to prolong restrictions on Japanses cars after 1992. But the EC needs to recognise clearly that the main victory of such policies are likely to be those interests which they ostensibly set out to protect.

Sales of new cars down almost 12% (FT).

More than 10% of families ran into arrears of debt last year.

Data Protection Registrar to investigate attempts by councils to compel householders to give names and addreses of people buying their homes (Independent).

Halifax reports small rise of 0.3% in house prices nationally (FT).

Kinnock calls for a public inquiry into Scargill affair.

Miners' leaders tell Scargill he will have to use his own money and not the NUM's - to finance any libel action. Some want him suspended while inquiry goes ahead.

Commons Motion urges Attorney General to refer allegations to DPP.

<u>Mirror</u>, which continues to pursue the issue, says if Scargill is telling the truth the rest are lying.

Air traffic controllers to have working day limited to 10 hours (Times).

Director-General of Design Council says managers are more obsessed with price than with design and quality and this is causing us to lose sales and to import.
