Dear Mr Coles.

I send you a self explanatory note for the Prime Minister. You may well, I appreciate, have yr. own leads to Señor Ulloa, or the Foreign Office may have: but just in case this cd. be helpful I send it you with all despatch.

I have the impression that Señor Ulloa wd like to come to talk to the Prime Minister; but that he will not come to London at all unless he gets a tip that she wd. probably be able to see him.

Knowing Señor Ulloa, & knowing a little of the part played by Ponsseca Peru recently I had thought it wd. be helpful if the Prime Minister cd. see him; I do not think that he will have turned into a rhetorician since I last saw him in November; but of course I do not know

what he will say.

I was distressed by the change, as it seemed to me to be in Dr Calder's personality since I last saw him. I had always thought that he was what he claimed to be yesterday: a moderate politician. ~~That~~ Yesterday though he seemed to have joined the fanatics. That information may I suppose have value. Great value perhaps. But it was exceptionally sad all the same.

He went away I must tell you shaken by the Prime Minister's determination and impressed by her willingness to argue. The conversation plainly made a great impression on him (He talked to me afterwards a little). But he <sup>did</sup> plainly told the Embassy that the meeting had been "a success". So I was told this morning. I said I was delighted he thought so.

I shall be at home during the weekend Sat. eve or anyone wish to put me Senior Ulloa through me. Yours sincerely
