You may like to know what happened following your telephone conversation with me about the "TV Eye" programme on the trial of the RAF officers in Zimbabwe. Thank you also for your letter of yesterday.

The Prime Minister, the Foreign Secretary and the Home Secretary shared your anxiety about this programme. Their concern was passed on to the Chairman of the IBA, and I understand that discussions continued throughout yesterday between the Home Office and the IBA and between the IBA and Thames Television. The Chairman and some of the members of the IBA personally saw the programme, but their eventual decision was that it should be allowed to go ahead.

We can now only hope that the repercussions are not damaging. Thank you for letting me know about the problem: we were able to ensure that the IBA considered it further at the highest level, with knowledge of the Government's concern.

## Trial of Airforce Officers in Zimbabwe

I have just received a telex from Mr. Alcock, of Gill Godlonton & Gerrans, reading as follows:-

## "To: Lord Goodman or Mr. Mansell

Thames Television is apparently making a film for its programme T.V. Eye about the Zimbabwe airforce trial. We believe this programme is scheduled to be screened in Britain on the 21st July 1983. The verdict in the airforce case is not expected before the end of August 1983. It is our view and the view of Mr. H. H. Ognal Q.C. that the screening of such programme prior to verdict could produce angry political consequences in Zimbabwe to the potential prejudice of our clients interests in the trial. Please could you advise Thames Television and the Independent Broadcasting Authority of our misgivings and could you tell them that we request that the screening of the T.V. Eye programme be postponed until after the Zimbabwe High Court gives its verdict.

Dear Richard,

Although the episode of the Thames TV programme about the Zimbabwe Air Force trial is now in the past, there is one amplification that we felt should be made. The minute of Thursday's Cabinet discussion (CC(83)24th Conclusions, Minute 2, third paragraph) records Lord Goodman as having said that the IBA had told him that they declined to stop the broadcast. This is certainly what Lord Goodman implied in his letter of 21 July to Robin Butler. However the IBA assure us that, when their Director of Television spoke to Lord Goodman (on 20 July), no decision had been taken and that this was made clear to Lord Goodman: indeed he was asked to provide further details of the telex message from Harare (which he never provided). The IBA did not reach a final decision on the programme until about 6.00 pm on Thursday, about three hours before transmission time; then the Chairman and some other Members of the Authority having viewed the final version of the programme and discussed fully the case for and against intervention decided that it would be right to transmit it. Lord Goodman and others were then informed.

I am sending a copy of this letter to the Private Secretaries to members of the Cabinet.
