The Mountbatten Ceremony: Wednesday, 2 November

Your Majesties, Your Royal Highnesses, Lady Mountbatten,  
My Lord Bishop, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen.

The memorial which, Your Majesty, I am about to invite you to unveil, is to one of the most notable men of our time, and one of the greatest public servants of our century.

This unique ceremony is the final stage of an initiative which began two years ago when a group of sponsors, of which I was proud to be Chairman, launched a public appeal to support the creation of a permanent memorial to Lord Mountbatten. That appeal met with a widespread and generous public response.

Lord Mountbatten holds a secure place in the history of the 20th century, as he does in the hearts and memories of those who knew him and served with him. A mere recitation of the posts in which he served and the honours he received for his services to the nation and its allies, tells the story of his achievements more powerfully than the most eloquent of panegyrics. To select but a few, almost at random, Admiral of the Fleet, Privy Counsellor, Knight of the Garter, Order of Merit, decorated with the Distinguished Service Order, Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour, Distinguished Service Medal of the United States, — the very summary of a fraction of his orders and decorations reads like a catalogue of the highest honours the Crown and people of Britain and their allies have it in their power to bestow.

But these letters, these high ranking titles and distinctions are but the symbols of actual achievement and service. He served in two world wars, in the first as a Junior Officer in the Fleet, in the second as one of the most distinguished of our national Commanders, controlling the operations not only of the Royal Navy, in which he had made his career, but of all three services.

When the war was over he went to India, as its last Viceroy, to preside over the peaceful transfer of power from the old Indian Empire to its successor states, and permanently to sweeten the relationships between the peoples of the subcontinent and Britain.

Even then his career was not at an end. He returned to the Navy, commanded in the Mediterranean, succeeded to the office of First Sea Lord, an office held with distinction and honour by his own father, and ended as Chief of the Defence Staff.

There can have been few careers as distinguished as this in the history of the nation. But despite all these distinctions, Earl Mountbatten, Dickie to so many, never lost the common touch, and was as much admired and beloved by the ordinary seaman or soldier he commanded or by the simple men and women in the street, as by the highest statesmen

/ and

and notabilities among whom he moved. Many who are here today will have abiding memories of his professional skill, his technical mastery, his inventive mind, his love of life, his strong sense of family.

It would be wrong to let this occasion pass (nor would he have wished it) without loving words of respectful and affectionate memory for Edwina his wife who helped him so much and was almost equally admired for her own contribution of service to his career and the well-being of the country, and whose earlier death saddened his later years.

He himself died at the hands of wicked men, but his memory lives on. We shall shortly see his effigy, a monument of metal and stone. Great men, it was once said, have no need of statues. Their fame lives on on the lips of every man and woman who knew them, and the whole earth which witnessed their achievements across the continent remains their lasting memorial.

Your Majesty, I ask you to unveil the memorial to Earl Mountbatten.

MOUNTBATTEN CEREMONY: WEDNESDAY, 2 NOVEMBER

The Prime Minister this morning asked the Lord Chancellor if he would be kind enough to think about what she might say in a 5-minute speech inviting the Queen to unveil the Mountbatten Statue on Wednesday, 2 November.

In case it may help the Lord Chancellor, I am enclosing the draft which has been submitted by the Ministry of Defence. This covers much of the right ground, but does not reach the heights of language at which I am sure the Prime Minister will be aiming.

The Lord Chancellor may like to know that the general plan for this occasion is that, after the Prime Minister has spoken for five minutes, the Queen will speak briefly, and finally Lady Mountbatten will say some words of thanks. The scheme agreed with the Palace is that the Prime Minister will speak about the Mountbatten Trust and then about Lord Mountbatten's achievements as a public servant, and the Queen will speak in a more personal way about him as a member of her family.

## THE EARL MOUNTBATTEN OF BURMA STATUE APPEAL

In July 1981 the Prime Minister, the Rt Hon Margaret Thatcher, launched a Public Appeal to raise funds for the erection of a statue to Admiral of the Fleet The Earl Mountbatten of Burma. Mrs Thatcher's co-sponsors were the Rt Hon Michael Foot, the Rt Hon David Steel, Admiral of the Fleet Sir Caspar John, Field Marshal the Lord Harding of Petherton, Marshal of the Royal Air Force Sir Dermot Boyle, the Lord Trevelyan and the Lord Zuckerman.

The cost of the statue and its Portland stone base has been financed largely by individuals, organisations and Associations who knew Lord Mountbatten personally. Over 4,000 donations were received from the United Kingdom, Commonwealth and world-wide contributors. As a large proportion of these donations were in the form of collective contributions from Companies, Clubs, the Services, Associations and many other public and private organisations and groups, the number of individuals who contributed to the Appeal totalled tens of thousands.

The names of contributors have been recorded in a hand-inscribed book which will be presented to The Countess Mountbatten of Burma today and subsequently kept at Broadlands.

The Trustees of the Appeal, from the Ministry of Defence, were the Rt Hon Michael Heseltine (who succeeded Sir John Nott), Sir Arthur Hockaday, Rear Admiral Sir Leslie Townsend and Mr Ewen Broadbent.

In 1982 a limited competition was held to select the sculptor, for which the Assessors were Admiral of the Fleet the Lord Lewin (Chairman); The Countess Mountbatten of Burma; Lady Pamela Hicks; Mr Alan Bowness, Director of the Tate Gallery; Sir Hugh Casson, President of the Royal Academy of Arts; Sir David Piper, Director of the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford; Sir Arthur Hockaday, then Second Permanent Under Secretary of State, Ministry of Defence; and Mr John Kaye, Directing Architect, Department of the Environment. Mr Henry Moore was available for consultation. They chose Mr Franta Belsky, whose nine foot statue will be unveiled by Her Majesty The Queen today.

## ADMIRAL OF THE FLEET THE EARL MOUNTBATTEN OF BURMA

Lord Mountbatten was born at Windsor on 25th June 1900. He was the younger son of Prince Louis of Battenburg and Princess Victoria of Hesse, a grand-daughter of Queen Victoria.

He joined the Royal Navy in 1913 and served at sea during World War I. As a young officer he specialised in wireless and invented several devices adopted by the Royal Navy. His book on polo, his main sport, is still an international best-seller. In 1939 he assumed command of HMS KELLY, a ship which was to become a legend. Soon after he joined, the ship was mined off the Tyne. In 1940 she was torpedoed in the North Sea, but Lord Mountbatten brought her home after 92 hours under tow during repeated air attacks. A year later, while still under his command, KELLY went down with guns firing during the Battle of Crete while being attacked by 24 Stuka dive bombers. Less than half her crew survived but the spirit of the ship has been perpetuated through the HMS KELLY Reunion Association which was formed by the survivors.

In 1942 Lord Mountbatten was appointed Chief of Combined Operations as an Acting Vice Admiral, Lieutenant General and Air Marshal. By 1943 he had been appointed Supreme Allied Commander of the new South East Asia Command as the youngest Admiral in the history of the Royal Navy.

After the War he was created Viscount Mountbatten of Burma and a Knight of the Garter, but before he could resume his naval career he was appointed to succeed Lord Wavell as the last Viceroy of India. In 1947 independence was given to India and the new Muslim state of Pakistan, but he was held in such high regard that the Indian government invited him to remain as their first Governor General. He was created Earl Mountbatten of Burma in 1947.

In 1955 he realised his ambition by becoming First Sea Lord and Chief of the Naval Staff, an appointment held by his father from 1912 to 1914. This was the first time a father and son had both become professional Head of the Navy: remarkably both were appointed by Winston Churchill. In 1959 he was promoted Admiral of the Fleet and became Chief of the Defence Staff. He ceased active duty in 1965. His many appointments included Colonel of The Life Guards, Colonel Commandant of the Royal Marines, and Governor and Lord Lieutenant of the Isle of Wight. In 1968 he became the first International President of the United World Colleges whose aim is to promote international understanding through education.

In May 1979 he opened his home, Broadlands in Hampshire, to the public just three months before his assassination at Mullaghmore in Ireland on 27th August 1979.

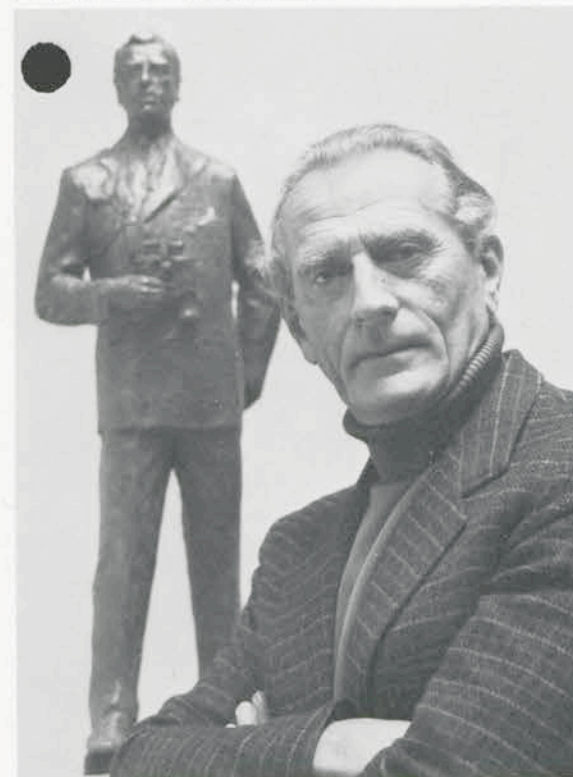

## FRANTA BELSKY, the Sculptor



Born in Czechoslovakia in 1921, Franta Belsky came to England shortly before the Second World War. He served in France in 1940 and was a gunner with various Allied Forces until 1945.

His art education began in the Prague Academy and the Royal College of Art, but he claims 'it is nowhere near completed yet'. He has produced a variety of sculptures, one of the largest being the fountain in the Shell Centre on the South Bank. One of his smallest was the crown coin minted to commemorate Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother's 80th birthday. His portrait sculptures include one of The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh, and another of Admiral Cunningham. Both these are in the National Portrait Gallery, London. According to Franta Belsky, the sculpture which took the most effort to conceive was that of Sir Winston Churchill for the memorial in Fulton, USA. The idea stemmed from a meeting with Sir Winston in 1940 and the sculpture was finished some 30 years later.

Work on the nine foot Statue of Lord Mountbatten began two years ago in Franta Belsky's London studio. He never met Lord Mountbatten, so worked entirely from photographs. He received, however, great help and co-operation from Lord Mountbatten's family and associates. The idea for the design of the base was developed at the same time.

The Statue was cast this summer in the Meridian Bronze Foundry in Peckham by Jack Crofton and his team who have cast all Franta Belsky's bronzes. The stepped stone pyramid which forms the base of the statue was designed by Charles Pollard, and the Contractors were Sir Robert McAlpine and Sons Ltd.

53 (1140) When all cars and coaches are clear of the Horse Guards Approach Road, the Guard of Honour will reform and return to Wellington Barracks with the Band of the Royal Marines.

The Lining Party and Standard Bearers will fall out.

The Statue Guard will fall out.

The State Trumpeters will fall out.

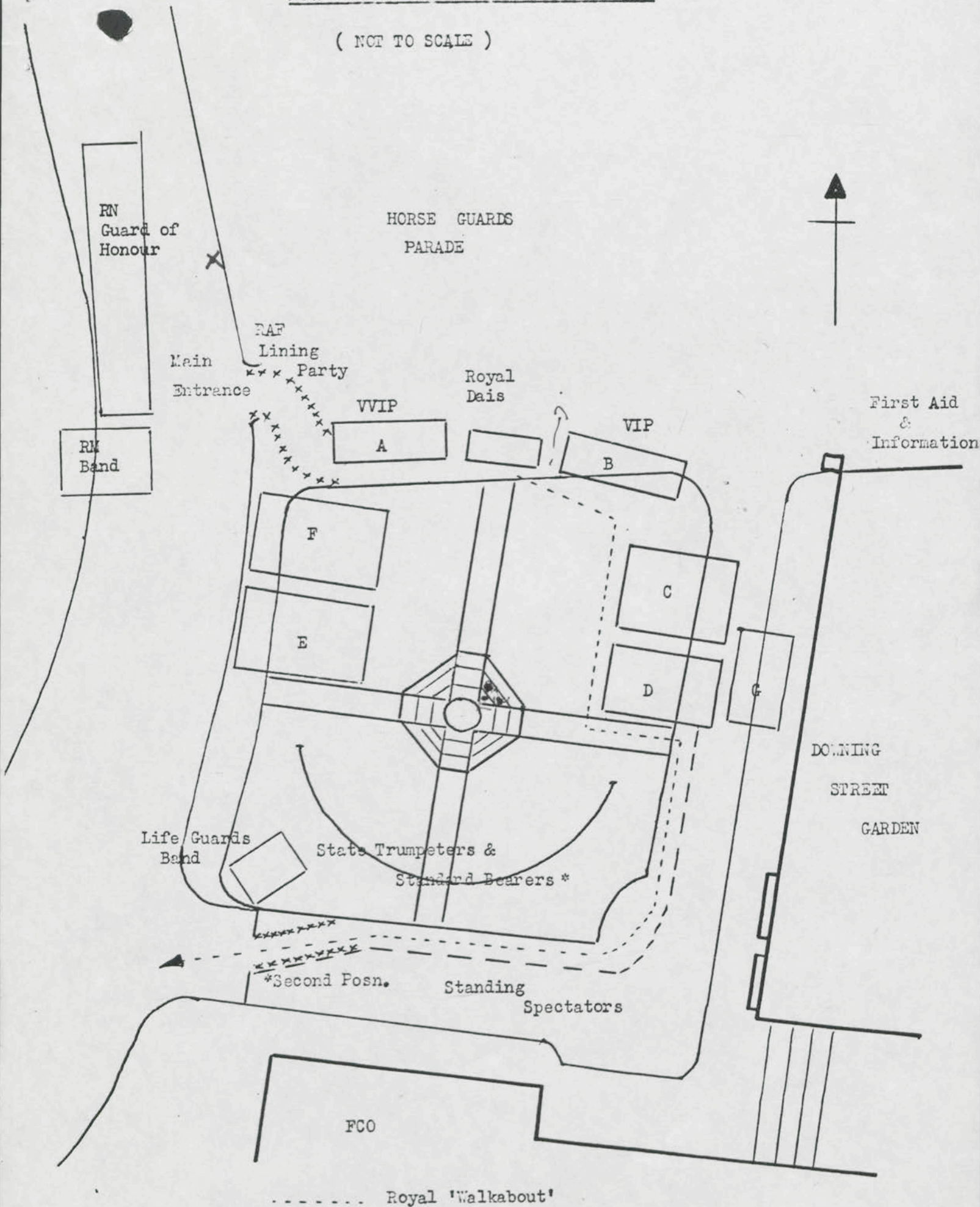

**MOUNTBATTEN STATUE—UNVEILING CEREMONY  
CEREMONIAL ON FOREIGN OFFICE GREEN**

GENERAL

1. Her Majesty The Queen, accompanied by His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh, will unveil the statue of the late Admiral of The Fleet The Earl Mountbatten of Burma, on Foreign Office Green at 1100 hours on Wednesday 2nd November 1983. After the ceremony the Prime Minister and Her Majesty's Government will hold a reception at The Banqueting House, Whitehall for invited guests.
2. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother and other members of the Royal Family, together with members of European Royal Families, will also be attending the ceremony.
3. Representatives of Ex Servicemen Associations closely connected with the late Earl Mountbatten are providing a Standard Bearer Party on Foreign Office Green. Representatives from the three Services are providing a Royal Guard of Honour, Bands and a Path Lining Party.
4. A diagram of Foreign Office Green is at Annex A.

COMMAND

5. Brigadier P G S Tower will command all troops on parade.

GUARD OF HONOUR

6. A Royal Navy Guard of Honour with The Queen's Colour and the Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Commander in Chief Naval Home Command is to be mounted in the Horse Guards Approach road by 1030 hours.
7. The Guard of Honour is to march to Horse Guards Approach Road from Wellington Barracks using the following route:

WELLINGTON BARRACKS EAST GATE  
BIRDCAGE WALK  
HORSE GUARDS APPROACH ROAD

leaving Wellington Barracks at 1012 hours.

PATH LINING PARTY

8. A Path Lining Party of one Warrant Officer and twenty airmen found by the Queen's Colour Squadron Royal Air Force is to be formed up at the main entrance to Foreign Office Green by 1027 hours and are to remain in position throughout the ceremony.
9. All members of the Path Lining Party are to report to Central London Recruiting Depot, 5 Great Scotland Yard by 0830 hours.

STANDARD BEARERS

10. A Standard Bearer Party of one Marshal and eighteen, found by Ex-Servicemen's Associations, is to be formed up on the south side of Foreign Office Green, flanking the State Trumpeters of The Life Guards, by 1030 hours. The Party is to remain in position until Her Majesty The Queen begins her Walkabout. They will then move to line the North and South sides of the Royal Exit to Horse Guards Approach road.
11. All members of the Standard Bearer Party are to report to the Standard Bearer Marshal at the Central London Recruiting Depot, 5 Great Scotland Yard by 0830 hours.

STATUE GUARD

12. A Statue Guard of two senior non commissioned officers found by The Life Guards is to be formed up on either side of the statue facing the Royal dais by 1015 hours. The Guard is to assist with the unveiling, if required, and then take charge of the Union Flag once the statue has been unveiled. After the Statue has been unveiled the Guard is to march off to the south west corner of the Ground with the Union Flag. Prior to the arrival of the Statue Guard at 1015 hours, the Statue is to be guarded by two non commissioned officers found by the Royal Military Police.

USHERS

13. The Chief Usher (Lieutenant Colonel J R Arthur, Scots Guards) and thirty two ushers found by the three Services are to assist in the arrival, seating and dispersal arrangements on Foreign Office Green.

14. All Service ushers are to report to the Chief Usher at Central London Recruiting Depot, 5 Great Scotland Yard by 0830 hours.

DUTY PERSONNEL

15. Duty personnel other than those mentioned at Paragraphs 6, 7, 12, and 19 are to report to Central London Recruiting Depot, 5 Great Scotland Yard by 0830 hours. Changing facilities will be available.

PROGRAMMES

16. Servicemen detailed from the three Services are to report to WO1 Muir, Scots Guards, in Horse Guards Building by 0845 hours to distribute programmes.

BANDS

17. Bands are to be positioned as follows:

*a.* Horse Guards Approach Road—Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Commander in Chief Naval Home Command.

*b.* Foreign Office Green (South West Side)—Band of The Life Guards.

18. The Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Commander in Chief Naval Home Command is to accompany the Royal Navy Guard of Honour and is to be in position by 1030 hours. During the Walkabout immediately following the unveiling ceremony the Band is to play incidental music.

19. The Band and State Trumpeters of The Life Guards are to report to Horse Guards Building by 0830 hours, where changing facilities will be available.

20. The Band of The Life Guards is to be in position by 1000 hours and is to play incidental music until the arrival of the Guard of Honour.

21. The State Trumpeters of The Life Guards are to be formed up on the south side of Foreign Office Green, flanked by the Standard Bearer Party, by 1030 hours. They are to sound a fanfare before and after the unveiling of the Statue. When Her Majesty The Queen begins her Walkabout, they are to move to a position in Horse Guards Approach Road South.

22. The Director of Music of the Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Commander in Chief Naval Home Command is to be responsible for coordinating arrangements with the Ministry of Defence (PS 12 (Army)) and is then to coordinate the distribution of instructions and of music to the bands taking part.

TIMINGS

23. The important timings and order of events are listed at Annex B. The March Table is at Annex C.

DISPERSAL

24. *a.* The Royal Navy Guard of Honour accompanied by the Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Commander in Chief Naval Home Command is to march back to Wellington Barracks as soon as the Royal Procession has left Foreign Office Green. The route is to be the outward route reversed.

*b.* The Path Lining Party is to remain in position for the duration of the Ceremony. They are to dismiss at the end of the ceremony as ordered by the Project Officer. (Commander I D G Garnett, Royal Navy)

*c.* The Standard Bearer Party is to remain in position at the southern exit to Horse Guards Approach Road until ordered to dismiss by the Project Officer.

*d.* The Statue Guard is to remain in position at the south west corner of the Ground until ordered to dismiss by the Project Officer.

*e.* The Band of The Life Guards is to march back to Horse Guards Building, via Horse Guards Approach Road (South), King Charles Street and Whitehall on the arrival of the Royal Navy Guard of Honour in Horse Guards Approach Road.

*f.* The State Trumpeters of The Life Guards are to remain in position in Horse Guards Approach Road until ordered to dismiss by the Project Officer.

*g.* The Ushers are to assist with the dispersal of spectators until ordered to dismiss by the Chief Usher.

25. The Guard of Honour is to pay the following compliments:

*a.* To Her Majesty The Queen:

*c.* Band of The Life Guards—State Dress. (Cloaks in event of wet weather).

*d.* State Trumpeters of The Life Guards—State Dress. (Cloaks in event of wet weather).

*e.* Path Lining Party—Greatcoat Order, White Belts, White Gloves.

*f.* Statue Guard—Dismounted Review Order, cloaked.

*g.* Servicemen/Servicewomen on duty:

(1) Indoor Duties—Full Day Ceremonial without Greatcoats and Swords.

(2) Outdoors Duties—Greatcoats, Gloves and Forage Caps.

MEDICAL

28. The Commander Medical Services is to arrange for the establishment by 0930 hours of Ambulance Car Posts on Horse Guards Parade (South Side) and MOD Car Park (North). St John Ambulance Posts will also be positioned at Foreign Office Green, St James's Park and the Banqueting House.

PROVOST

29. The Assistant Provost Marshal is to arrange for:

*a.* Provision of a Statue Guard on Foreign Office Green until the arrival of the Ceremonial Statue Guard at 1015 hours.

*b.* Traffic control, ticket check points and parking of vehicles on Horse Guards Parade, Whitehall Gate and Horse Guards Approach Road.

- c. Control of traffic and parking as required in Wellington Barracks, in conjunction with the Camp Commandant, Wellington Barracks.
- d. Provision of a ticket check point at the rear entrance of the Banqueting House.
- e. Control of access and car door openers at the Royal United Services Institute.
- f. Control of parking in Great Scotland Yard in conjunction with the Metropolitan Police.

#### SECURITY

30. Security instructions will be issued by SO2 G2 in consultation with the Metropolitan Police.

#### WET WEATHER

31. In the event of wet weather there will be no separate wet weather programme. A decision on wet weather dress will be taken by Brigadier P G S Tower at 0930 hours.

#### COMMUNICATIONS

32. The Commander Communications is to provide the following:

- a. Radio communications between Headquarters London District Operations Room, Wellington Barracks, Foreign Office Green Command Post, the Project Officer, the Chief Usher, the Banqueting House and The Royal United Services Institute.
- b. A public address system for use on the Royal dais on Foreign Office Green with a capacity to broadcast to spectators and members of the public in St. James's Park.
- c. All watches are to be synchronised by British Telecom Time (Dial 123).

#### RECEPTION

33. The Reception at the Banqueting House after the ceremony is by invitation only. Coordinating administrative arrangements for this are the responsibility of the Ministry of Defence (PS 12 (Army)).

#### ACCOMMODATION

34. Accommodation for members of the three Services is strictly limited in the London Area. Requirements by units are to be made known to G4 Branch this Headquarters by 10th October 1983. G4 Branch will then issue separate instructions as necessary.

35. All contingents are responsible for their own midday meal and are to ensure that their assembly areas are clear of litter before they disperse.

#### CAR PARKING

36. No car parking facilities are available for private cars. Limited car parking facilities are available for Service transport on Horse Guards Parade, however all Service transport conveying passengers to the Central London Recruiting Depot, will be able to park in Great Scotland Yard. Parking for the Royal Navy Guard of Honour and Royal Marine band will be available at Wellington Barracks.

#### REHEARSAL

37. A full rehearsal will take place on Foreign Office Green at 1400 hours on Tuesday 1st November 1983. The following are to attend:

- a. The Royal Navy Guard of Honour.
- b. Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Commander in Chief Naval Home Command.
- c. Band and State Trumpeters The Life Guards.
- d. The Statue Guard.
- e. The Royal Air Force Path Lining Party.
- f. The Standard Bearers.
- g. Representatives from London District Provost Company Royal Military Police.
- h. Representatives from the Royal Navy back up team.

- i. Representatives from the Royal Marine Fatigue Party.
- j. Representatives from the Royal Air Force back up teams.
- k. Representatives as detailed by Commander Medical Services.
- l. Representatives as detailed by Commander Communications.
- m. Service Ushers. (After attending the Ushers Briefing—See Paragraph 39).

38. A separate instruction will be issued by Headquarters London District in due course.

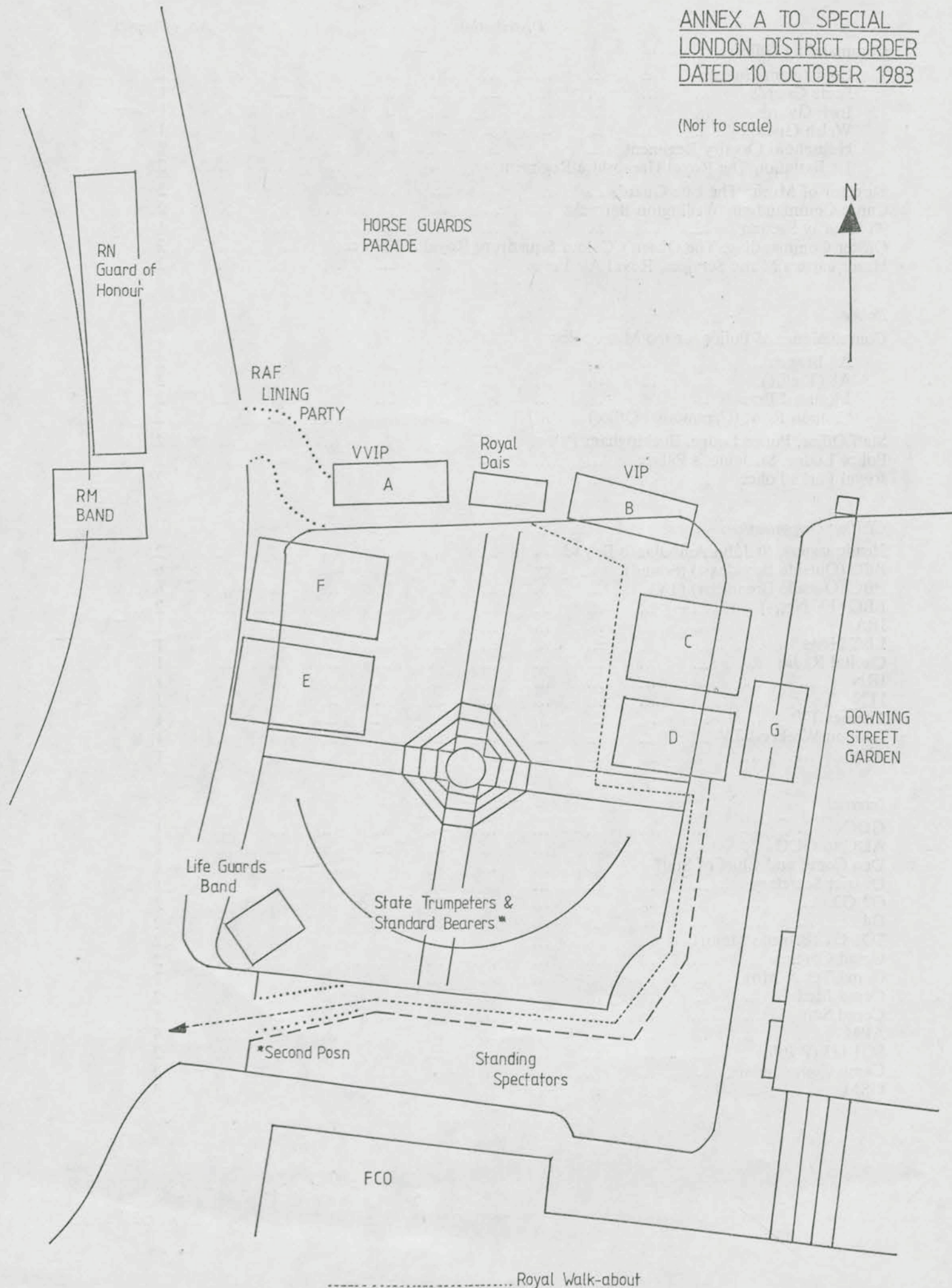

DETAILED ORDER OF EVENTS

(Approximate timings are in brackets)

- 0730-0930 Final arrangements made on the Ground.
- From 0945 Guests start arriving.  
Those approaching by car will approach via The Mall and The Horse Guards Approach Road. Chauffeur-driven cars will drop passengers at the rear of the Royal Dais before parking on the north and south sides of Horse Guards Parade. Guests will walk to the stands. Standing spectators will approach from Birdcage Walk.
- 1000 The Band of The Life Guards will take up position at the south west corner of the Ground. The band will remain standing and play a selection of music while guests are assembling.
- 1015 Ceremonial Statue Guard takes up position.
- 1025 All guests, other than Royal guests, to be in position. Royal Navy Guard of Honour found by HMS EXCELLENT with the Band of HM Royal Marines, Commander-in-Chief Naval Home Command approaches the Ground.  
The Secretary of State for Defence arrives at the entrance to the Ground.
- 1027 Royal Air Force Path Lining Party form up at the main entrance to the Ground. It will remain in position throughout the Ceremony.  
The Band of The Life Guards marches off.
- 1030 Standard Bearers of Service and Ex-Service Associations, followed by The State Trumpeters of The Life Guards, take up position to the south of the Statue and form up in a crescent with the Standard Bearers flanking the Trumpeters.  
The Countess Mountbatten of Burma and The Lady Pamela Hicks arrive at the main entrance to the Ground, and are greeted by the Secretary of State for Defence.
- 1030 RN Guard of Honour and RM Band in position on Horse Guards Approach Road.
- 1032 The Prime Minister, Mr. Thatcher and the PM's Private Secretary arrive at the entrance to the Ground, and are greeted by the Secretary of State for Defence.
- 1035 Members of Foreign Royal Families arrive. Guard of Honour Presents Arms.
- 1040 Members of The Royal Family arrive. Guard of Honour Presents Arms.
- (1048) The Prime Minister and Lady Mountbatten move from the Dais to the entrance to the Ground.
- 1050 His Majesty The King of Norway arrives. Guard of Honour Presents Arms and Lowers the Colour.
- 1055 Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother arrives, and is greeted by the Defence Services Secretary. The Guard of Honour Presents Arms and Lowers the Colour. The National Anthem will be played.
- 1100 Her Majesty The Queen accompanied by His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh will arrive opposite the Guard of Honour. They will be greeted by the Prime Minister. The Guard Presents Arms and Lowers the Colour. The National Anthem will be played. The Queen inspects the Guard of Honour.
- (1105) On arrival at the Dais, The Queen will sit down followed by all other guests. The Prime Minister will make a short speech of welcome and invite The Queen to unveil the Statue.

- (1110) The Prime Minister sits down. The Queen speaks.
- (1113) The Queen, accompanied by the Prime Minister and Lady Mountbatten, walks forward to unveil the Statue.  
A fanfare is sounded by The State Trumpeters as The Queen walks forward. It will end as The Queen reaches the base of the plinth.
- (1115) The Statue is unveiled.  
A second fanfare is sounded by The State Trumpeters as The Queen returns to the Dais.
- (1117) The Queen, accompanied by the Prime Minister and Lady Mountbatten return to the Dais. The Statue Guard marches off to the south west corner of the Ground with the Union Flag.
- (1118) Mr R Wilkins, the Secretary of the HMS KELLY Re-Union Association, moves forward to the Dais bearing the Book of Donors which will be presented to Lady Mountbatten. One of The Queen's Gurkha Orderly Officers steps forward to receive the Book from Lady Mountbatten.
- (1119) Lady Mountbatten speaks.
- (1121) The Lord Bishop of London will say a prayer of dedication.
- (1122) The Prime Minister takes leave of The Queen who, with The Duke of Edinburgh, Lady Mountbatten and Lady Pamela Hicks leaves the Dais. Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother will join The Queen.
- Presentations.
- (1125) As the presentations are being made The State Trumpeters march off. The Standard Bearers reform either side of the Royal exit to the Horse Guards Approach Road.
- (1130) The Queen, The Duke of Edinburgh and Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother will move behind the Statue accompanied by Lady Mountbatten, Lady Pamela Hicks and the Secretary of State for Defence. An informal Walkabout will take place past representatives of the Services, Ex-Service Associations and public subscribers who have been standing spectators at the ceremony.
- (1133) As The Queen reaches The Standard Bearers, other members of Royal Families with those in attendance, and the Mountbatten Family, will be ushered from their seats to view the Statue if they wish.
- (1135) The Queen, The Duke of Edinburgh, Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, Lady Mountbatten and Lady Pamela Hicks will leave the Ground.  
The cars will move via Horse Guards Arch and Whitehall to the front entrance of the RUSI where the Prime Minister will be waiting to receive the guests.  
Guard of Honour Presents Arms and Lowers the Colour as The Queen passes.  
At Horses Guards The Queen's Life Guard is to turn out, the Standard is to be lowered and the Trumpeter is to sound the Royal Salute.
- (1137) After The Queen has left the Ground the remaining members of the Royal Families, and the Mountbatten family leave by car and coach for the RUSI. Cars will go via Horse Guards Arch; the Coach via Trafalgar Square.
- (1137) After The Queen has been saluted by the Guard of Honour, guests start to disperse. Those attending the Reception move immediately on foot to the rear entrance of the Banqueting House across Horse Guards Parade and through Horse Guards Arch. Guests in stand B will go to the Banqueting House by coaches which will be waiting behind the Dais. Pedestrians will be restricted initially to the pavement through Horse Guards Arch to avoid obstructing the last few Royal cars.

- (1140) When all cars and coaches are clear of the Horse Guards Approach Road, the Guard of Honour will reform and return to Wellington Barracks with the Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Commander in Chief Home Command.  
The Lining Party and Standard Bearers will fall out.  
The Statue Guard will fall out.  
The State Trumpeters will fall out.  
End of Ceremony.
- (1245) The Queen and other members of the Royal Family leave the Banqueting House for Buckingham Palace. The cars will move via Whitehall and Horse Guards Arch.  
At Horse Guards The Queen's Life Guard is to turn out, the Standard is to be lowered and the Trumpeter is to sound the Royal Salute.
- (By 1330) Other Guests leave the reception at the Banqueting House.

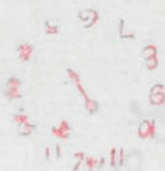

SECURITY INSTRUCTION FOR THE UNVEILING CEREMONY, REHEARSAL AND RECEPTION  
- MOUNTBATTEN MEMORIAL CEREMONY - 1 & 2 NOV 83

Reference:

A. Special London District Order.

R15/10

SITUATION

1. a. Her Majesty The Queen accompanied by His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh is to unveil the statue of the late Admiral of the Fleet, The Earl Mountbatten of Burma on Foreign Office Green at 1100 hrs Wed 2 Nov 83. This will be followed by a reception at the Banqueting House, Whitehall. A rehearsal for service personnel is to be held the previous day 1 Nov 83.

b. It is considered necessary to have security instructions to cover any attempt to disrupt the ceremony or rehearsal by terrorists, extremists or mentally unbalanced persons.

c. The Metropolitan Police are to retain full responsibility for preventative security before and during the ceremony and rehearsal including:

(1) Searching the area and random searches of guests and spectators. These searches exclude Public Buildings overlooking the Parade Ground which remain the responsibility of the Security Officers concerned.

(2) Passing any warnings to guests, spectators and servicemen.

(3) Controlling the evacuation of guests and spectators.

(4) Bomb disposal.

c. The Threat. There is no specific information available to suggest that the ceremony or rehearsal are likely to be the subject of any hostility from Irish Republican or other extremist elements. However the following current threats should be considered:

(1) Threat from Irish Republican Extremists. In the light of the assessed intent of the Provisional Irish Republican Army (PIRA) and the Irish National Liberation Army (INLA) to gain maximum publicity for their aims, it is possible that either organisation might attempt to disrupt the ceremony.

RESTRICTED

(2) Threat from Extreme Left Activists. It is assessed that direct disruption of the ceremony by Extreme Left Activists is unlikely but such factions may use the opportunity to demonstrate nearby creating a law and order problem which would indirectly affect security.

(3) Threat from Extreme Right Activists. It is assessed that no direct threat to the ceremony exists from Extreme Right Activists, but should they decide to confront any Extreme Left demonstrators near the ceremony this could result in violence which could affect security.

(4) Threat from a Crank or Lunatic. It is assessed that apart from the threat from Irish Republican Extremists the threat from a crank or lunatic is the most dangerous threat, because motivation, target and method are unpredictable.

d. The Metropolitan Police are to continue to monitor the threats to the ceremony and rehearsal and will inform this Headquarters immediately of any increased threat. The warning will be passed to all concerned.

MISSION

2. HQ London District is to assist the Metropolitan Police in the preparation and maintenance of the security for the Mountbatten Memorial Ceremony, rehearsal and reception.

EXECUTION

3. a. General Outline.

(1) Security action required by the servicemen involved is divided into 5 parts:

- (a) Preparation stage.
- (b) Move to ceremony positions.
- (c) Ceremony.
- (d) The return to dispersal areas.
- (e) Normal dispersal.
- (f) Reception.

(2) Security awareness by all participants is paramount and all service commanders involved are to stress this when briefing all ranks.

(3) Servicemen are to be warned to be alert for any activity which is abnormal and which might affect security and are to be told to report such activity immediately to their superior or to the nearest policeman.

RESTRICTED

b. Preparation Stage.

(1) Metropolitan Police will be responsible for all security outside service premises.

(2) The Senior Lieutenant Colonel remains responsible for the security of Wellington Barracks and the Camp Commandant London District for HQ London District Horse Guards Building and the Central London Recruiting Depot (CLRD), 5 Great Scotland Yard.

(3) The responsibility for the security of the Guard of Honour, Path Lining Party, Standard Bearers and Statue Guard is vested in the Metropolitan Police but commanders at all levels are to report anything suspicious to the civil police.

c. The Move to and from Ceremonial Positions. The Metropolitan Police are responsible for the security of servicemen moving from:

- (1) Wellington Barracks.
- (2) HQ London District.
- (3) CLRD - Great Scotland Yard.

to their ceremonial positions and return but all servicemen taking part are to assist by informing accompanying police of anything suspicious seen en route.

d. The Ceremony - Evacuation Procedure.

(1) If evacuation of the ceremonial area is required by the Police, as a result of a specific threat or incident, the Senior Police Officer will decide on evacuation routes and priorities and inform the Command Post accordingly.

(2) Lt Col M G L Whiteley SG DCOS G1 HQ London District will issue the necessary orders for the evacuation of service personnel.

e. Normal Dispersal.

(1) Resident units are responsible for the security of barracks or buildings from which servicemen are dispersing.

(2) Service units embussing in dispersal barracks are advised to arrange a different route back to unit locations.

(3) Where contractors' coaches are used normal protective security drills are to be carried out, ie the coaches are to be searched prior to embussing/loading.

(4) Care is to be taken at this stage to stress personal security once dispersal is completed at the final destination.

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f. Reception - Banqueting House.

(1) The Metropolitan Police are responsible for the security of the Reception to be held at the Banqueting House.

(2) Service personnel acting as ushers and reception staff are to inform the police immediately should they notice anything abnormal which could affect security.

g. Clearance of Horse Guards Building and Queens Guard Area. A separate security instruction is to be issued to those concerned with the security of the Horse Guards Building.

COMMAND AND SIGNAL

4. a. Police/Military Liaison. Liaison will be maintained by the co-location of the Senior Police Officer, and the DCOS G1 HQ London District at or near the Command Post Foreign Office Green and the SO2 G2 in New Scotland Yard Operations Room.

b. Operations Room. The Operations Room (Room 100) HQ London District will be open from 0900 hours on 2 Nov 83. It will be manned by:

- (1) SO2 G3 (Ops/O&D).
- (2) Camp Staff Representative.
- (3) Radio Operator - 10 Signal Regiment.
- (4) Radio Operator - Metropolitan Police.



### THE EARL MOUNTBATTEN OF BURMA STATUE APPEAL

In July 1981 the Prime Minister, the Rt Hon Margaret Thatcher, launched a Public Appeal to raise funds for the erection of a memorial statue to Admiral of the Fleet The Earl Mountbatten of Burma. Mrs Thatcher's co-sponsors were the Rt Hon Michael Foot, the Rt Hon David Steel, Admiral of the Fleet Sir Caspar John, Field Marshal the Lord Harding of Petherton, Marshal of the Royal Air Force Sir Dermot Boyle, Lord Trevelyan and Lord Zuckerman.

The cost of the statue and its Portland stone base has been financed largely by individuals, organisations and Associations who knew Lord Mountbatten personally. Over 4000 donations were received from United Kingdom, Commonwealth and world-wide contributors. As a large proportion of these donations were in the form of collective contributions from Companies, Clubs, the Services, Associations and many other public and private organisations and groups, the number of individuals who contributed to the Appeal totalled tens of thousands.

The names of contributors have been recorded in a hand-inscribed book which will be presented to The Countess Mountbatten of Burma today and subsequently kept at Broadlands.

The Trustees of the Appeal, from the Ministry of Defence, were the Rt Hon Michael Heseltine (who succeeded Sir John Nott), Sir Arthur Hockaday, Rear Admiral Sir Leslie Townsend and Mr Ewen Broadbent.

In 1982 a limited competition was held to select the sculptor, for which the Assessors were Admiral of the Fleet the Lord Lewin (Chairman); The Countess Mountbatten of Burma; Lady Pamela Hicks; Mr Alan Bowness, Director of the Tate Gallery; Sir Hugh Casson, President of the Royal Academy of Arts; Sir David Piper, Director of the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford; Sir Arthur Hockaday, then Second Permanent Under Secretary of State, Ministry of Defence; and Mr John Kaye, Directing Architect, Department of the Environment. Mr Henry Moore was available for consultation. They chose Mr Franta Belsky, whose nine foot statue will be unveiled by Her Majesty The Queen today.

ADMIRAL OF THE FLEET THE EARL MOUNTBATTEN OF BURMA

KQ, PC, GCB, OM, GCSI, GCIE, GCVO, DSO

Lord Mountbatten was born at Windsor on 25th June 1900. He was the younger son of Prince Louis of Battenberg and Princess Victoria of Hesse, a grand-daughter of Queen Victoria.

He joined the Royal Navy in 1913 and served at sea during World War I. As a young officer he specialised in wireless and invented several devices adopted by the Royal Navy. His book on polo, his main sport, is still an international best-seller. In 1939 he assumed command of HMS KELLY, a ship which was to become a legend. Soon after he joined, the Ship was mined off the Tyne. In 1940 she was torpedoed in the North Sea, but Lord Mountbatten brought her home after 92 hours under tow during repeated air attacks. A year later while still under his command, KELLY went down with guns firing during the Battle of Crete while being attacked by 24 Stuka dive bombers. Less than half her crew survived but the spirit of the Ship has been perpetuated through the HMS KELLY Re-Union Association which was formed by the survivors.

In 1942 Lord Mountbatten was appointed Chief of Combined Operations as an Acting Vice Admiral, Lieutenant General and Air Marshal. By 1943 he had been appointed Supreme Allied Commander of the new South East Asia Command as the youngest Admiral in the history of the Royal Navy.

After the War he was created Viscount Mountbatten of Burma and a Knight of the Garter, but before he could resume his naval career he was appointed to succeed Lord Wavell as the last Viceroy of India. In 1947 independence was given to India and the new Muslim state of Pakistan, but he was held in such high regard that the Indian government invited him to remain as their first Governor General. He was created Earl Mountbatten of Burma in 1947.

In 1955 he realised his ambition by becoming First Sea Lord and Chief of the Naval Staff, an appointment held by his father from 1912 to 1914. This was the first <sup>remarkably</sup> ~~by coincidence~~ time a father and son had both become professional Head of the Navy: both were appointed by Winston Churchill. In 1959 he was promoted Admiral of the Fleet and became Chief of the Defence Staff. He ceased active duty in 1965. His many appointments included Colonel of The Life Guards, Colonel Commandant of the Royal Marines, and Governor and Lord Lieutenant of the Isle of Wight. In 1968 he became the first International President of the United World Colleges whose aim is to promote international understanding through education.

In May 1979 he opened his home, Broadlands in Hampshire, to the public just three months before his assassination at Mullaghmore in Ireland on 27th August 1979.

FRANTA BELSKY, the Sculptor

Born in Czechoslovakia in 1921, Franta Belsky came to England shortly before the Second World War. He served in France in 1940 and was a gunner with various Allied Forces until 1945.

His art education began in the Prague Academy and the Royal College of Art, but he claims 'it is nowhere near completed yet'. He has produced a variety of sculptures, one of the largest being the fountain in the Shell Centre on the South Bank. One of his smallest was the crown coin minted to commemorate Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother's 80th birthday. His portrait sculptures include one of The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh, and another of Admiral Cunningham. Both these are in the National Portrait Gallery, London. According to Franta Belsky, the sculpture which took the most effort to conceive was that of Sir Winston Churchill for the memorial in Fulton, USA. The idea stemmed from a meeting with Sir Winston in 1940 and the sculpture was finished some 30 years later.

Work on the nine foot state of Lord Mountbatten began two years ago in Franta Belsky's London studio. He never met Lord Mountbatten, so worked entirely from photographs. He received, however, great help and co-operation from Lord Mountbatten's family and associates. The idea for the design of the base was developed at the same time.

The Statue was cast this summer in the Meridian Bronze Foundry in Peckham by Jack Crofton and his team who have cast all Franta Belsky's bronzes. The stepped stone pyramid which forms the base of the statue was designed by Charles Pollard, and the Contractors were Sir Robert McAlpine and Sons Ltd.

- 35 (1118) Mr R Wilkins, the Secretary of the HMS KELLY Re-Union Association, moves forward to the Dais bearing the Book of Donors which will be presented to Lady Mountbatten.
- One of The Queen's Gurkha Orderly Officers steps forward to receive the Book from Lady Mountbatten.
- 37 (1119) Lady Mountbatten speaks.
- 39 (1121) The Lord Bishop of London will say a prayer of dedication.
- 41 (1122) The Prime Minister takes leave of The Queen who, with The Duke of Edinburgh, Lady Mountbatten and Lady Pamela Hicks leaves the Dais. All guests should stand. Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother will join The Queen. As the Royal party is proceeding to the presentations, the Prime Minister will leave the Dais and the Ground passing between the Dais and stand B. She will go by car to the RUSI with her Private Secretary.
- 42 The Royal party will then move to the front of block C where the Secretary of State or Defence will present to The Queen, in the following order:

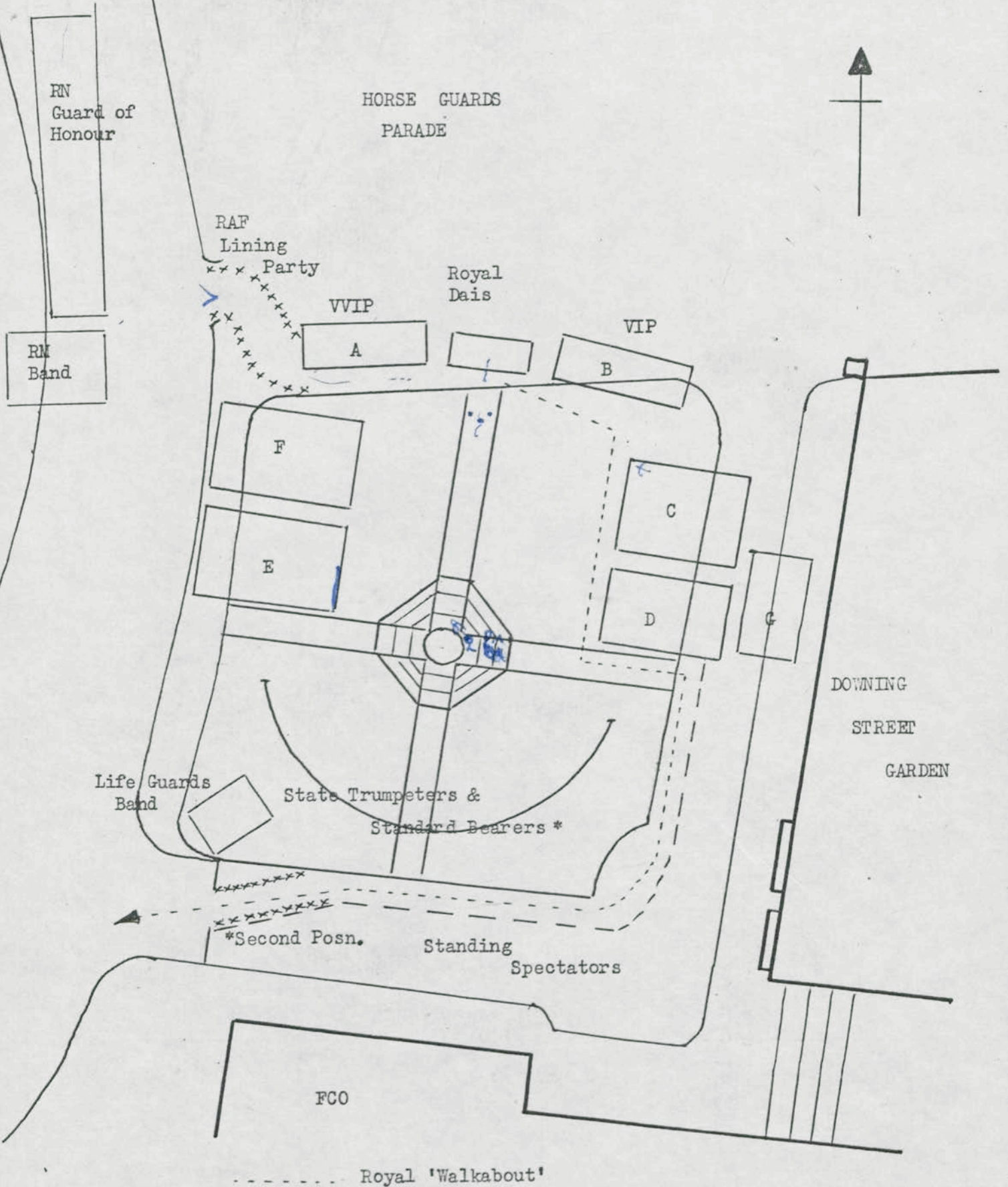
- 43 (1125) As the presentations are being made The State Trumpeters march off. The Standard Bearers reform either side of the Royal exit to the Horse Guards Approach Road.

- 45 (1130) The Queen, The Duke of Edinburgh and Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother will move behind the Statue accompanied by Lady Mountbatten, Lady Pamela Hicks and the Secretary of State for Defence. An informal 'walkabout' will take place past representatives of the Services, Ex-Service Associations and public subscribers who have been standing spectators at the ceremony. Other guests may be seated as Her Majesty reaches the standing spectators.
- 47 (1133) As The Queen reaches the Standard Bearers, other members of Royal Families and the Mountbatten Family, will be ushered from their seats to view the Statue if they wish.
- 49 1135 The Queen, The Duke of Edinburgh, Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, Lady Mountbatten and Lady Pamela Hicks will leave the Ground. They will be accompanied by the Secretary of State for Defence and Brigadier Winder.
- The cars will move via Horse Guards Arch and Whitehall to the front entrance of the RUSI where the Prime Minister will be waiting to receive the guests.
- Guard of Honour Presents Arms and Lowers the Colour as The Queen passes.
- 51 (1137) After The Queen has left the Ground the remaining members of The Royal Families, and the Mountbatten Family leave by cars and coach for the RUSI. Cars will go via Horse Guards Arch: the Coaches via Trafalgar Square. Royal guests will leave either by the western approach to the Statue having viewed it, or by the main entrance to the Ground if they do not wish to view the Statue. Royal cars will be drawn up on the western side of the Green between The Queen's car and the Band of the Royal Marines by 1130. Two coaches will be waiting behind the Royal party's cars.
- (1137) After The Queen has been saluted by the Guard of Honour, guests start to disperse. Those attending the Reception move immediately on foot to the rear entrance of the Banqueting House across Horse Guards Parade and through Horse Guards Arch. Guests in stand B will go to the Banqueting House by coaches which will be waiting behind the Dais. Pedestrians will be constrained initially to the pavement through Horse Guards Arch to avoid obstructing the last few Royal cars.
- 53 (1140) When all cars are clear of the Horse Guards Approach Road, the Guard of Honour will reform and return to Wellington Barracks with the Band of the Royal Marines.
- The Lining Party and Standard Bearers will fall out.
- The Statue Guard will fall out.
- The State Trumpeters will fall out.
- End of Ceremony.
- 55 (1400) Unrig stands and seating.

The Duke of Edinburgh will enter leaving the Throne to his right. Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, <sup>with the Secretary of State for Defence</sup> will follow The Queen. The King of Norway, <sup>conducted by Viscount Whitelaw,</sup> will follow The Duke of Edinburgh. <sup>conducted by CDS,</sup> When the Royal guests arrive in the reception, ~~the Secretary of State for Defence will join the Duke of Edinburgh; Viscount Whitelaw will join The King of Norway.~~ As The Queen enters the Banqueting Hall a short fanfare will be sounded by the RAF Orchestra. 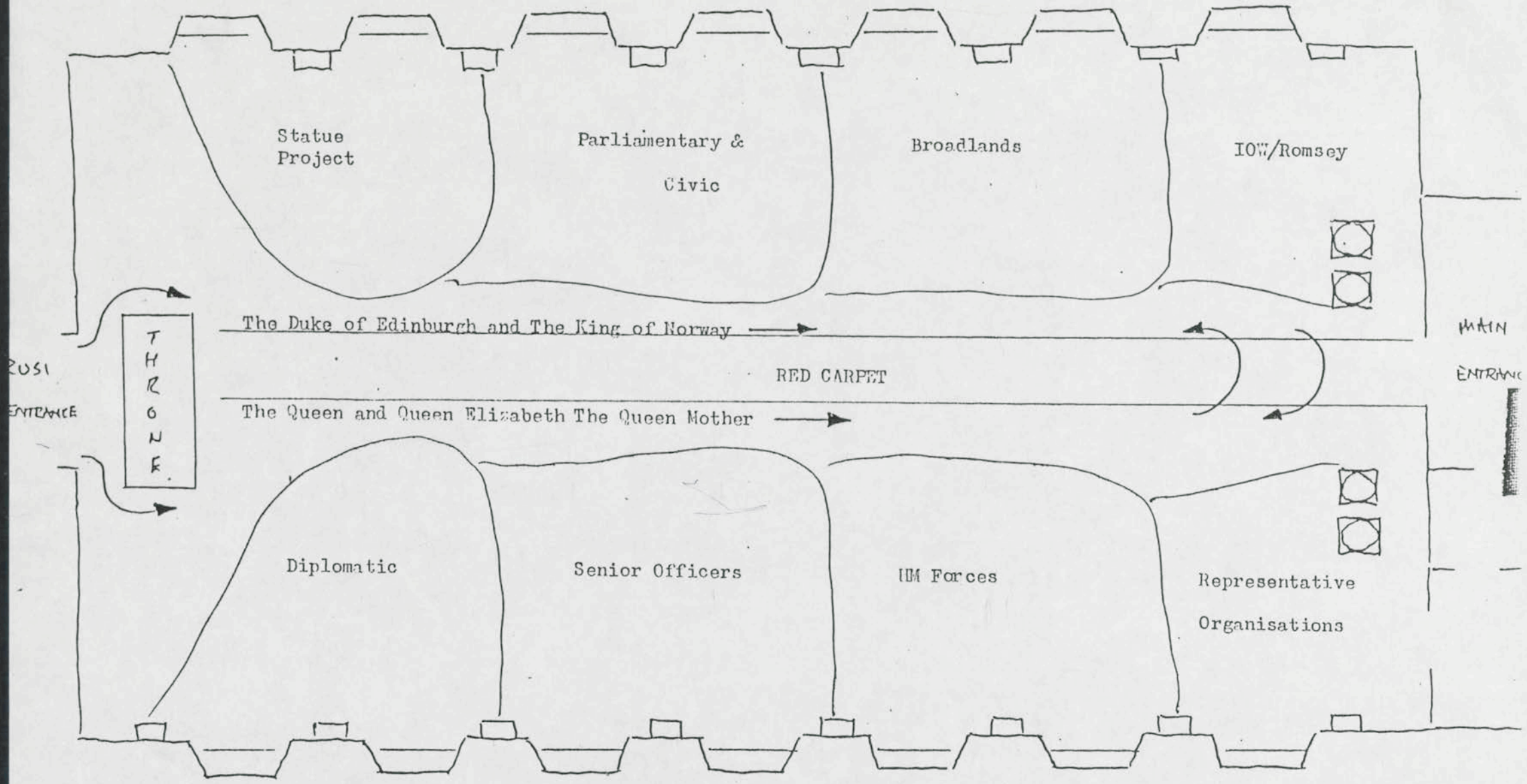
The 4 Royal guests will proceed past each of the 8 groups of guests, initially The Queen and Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, on the right, The Duke of Edinburgh and The King of Norway on the left. They will cross over at the north end of the Banqueting Hall and return to the Throne by 1245. At each group the Gentlemen Ushers will present a number of guests.

- 17 1245 The Queen, The Duke of Edinburgh, Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother and The King of Norway <sup>will proceed to the Horse Guards Arch entrance and the other accompanying Ministers</sup> accompanied by the Prime Minister. They will be conducted to the RUSI entrance <sup>whence they will leave by car for Buckingham Palace.</sup> The Prime Minister will remain at the RUSI entrance. <sup>return to the Banqueting Hall to take part of the other guests can take leave of her.</sup>
- 19 1246 As soon as The Queen has left the Reception, the remaining Royal guests and members of the Mountbatten Family will leave the Reception via RUSI. They will go by car or coach to Buckingham Palace. Cars will go through Horse Guards Arch; the coach via Trafalgar Square.
