FALKLANDS AT THE UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Deer Charles, John Agree this is Africally the Falklands at the UNGA CD.

A number of our posts have recommended further high level messages to support our lobbying effort on the Falklands vote at the UNGA. This is also the strong advice of Sir John Thomson in New York, where, as the Foreign Secretary told Cabinet this morning, the "soft" Argentine draft resolution is attracting growing support. We need to draw governments' attention to our draft amendments without delay.

The Foreign Secretary intends to send the majority of these messages. But Sir Julian Bullard has recommended that the Prime Minister send a message to Chancellor Kohl (Bonn telno 1116 enclosed). The Germans' intentions remain unclear, but they may well be reluctant to be left behind if the French change their vote: others would almost certainly then follow. The Anglo- German Summit on 27 November is too late for lobbying. The Foreign Secretary therefore recommends that the Prime Minister send a message as in the enclosed draft.

YOUR TELNO 159 TO ABIDJAN: FALKLANDS AT THE UN

- 1. MINISTER TOOK ACTION THIS MORNING WITH SUDHOFF (DUS EQUIVALENT FOR THE THIRD WORLD), WHO WAS ACCOMPANIED BY KULLACK-UBLICK. WILLIAMS ALSO TOOK PARALLEL ACTION WITH THE AUS'S FOR THE WEST AND THE UNITED NATIONS (VON PLOETZ AND FRAU FINKE-OSIANDER).
- 2. THE GERMANS HAD ALREADY HEARD OF THE AMENDMENTS WE INTEND TO TABLE THROUGH THEIR DELEGATION IN NEW YORK. THEY CAVE CLEAR ASSURANCES THAT THE FRG WOULD VOTE IN FAVOUR OF THEM.
- 3. ALL OUR INTERLOCUTORS MADE IT CLEAR HOWEVER THAT THE GERMANS WERE IN GREAT DIFFICULTY OVER THE DRAFT RESOULUTION ITSELF. WITH OR WITHOUT OUR AMENDMENTS, IT WAS WHOLLY CONSISTENT WITH THE LINE THAT THE FRG HAD TAKEN IN EXPLANTATIONS OF VOTE IN EAPLIER YEARS. THE

* THE FRG HAD TAKEN IN EXPLANTATIONS OF VOTE IN EARLIER YEARS. THE DECISION WOULD REST WITH GENSCHER AND HIS OFFICIALS WERE NOT PREPARED TO SPECULATE AS TO HOW IT MIGHT GO.

4. I RAISED THE SUBJECT TODAY WITH GENSCHER IN THE SAME TERMS AS I HAD DONE WITH KOHL (MY TELNO 1107 PARA 9). GENSCHER LOOKED SERIOUS. AND RUHFUS (WHO WAS ALSO PRESENT) SAID THAT THE TROUBLE WAS THAT THE ARGENTINES HAD CONCOCTED A MILDER RESOLUTION THIS TIME. I SAID THAT IF THIS MEANT THEY WANTED TO AVOID A CLASH IN THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. IT WAS WELCOME. BUT THE SUBSTANCE OF THE RESOLUTION WAS THE SAME. IT DENIED THE PRINCIPLE OF SELF-DETERMINATION, AND WE HAD DECIDED TO PUT IN AMENDMENTS TO MAKE THIS POINT CLEAR. WHAT WE WERE ASKING WAS FOR OUR PARTNERS TO CONTINUE TO AESTAIN ON A MATTER WHICH WAS OF SECONDARY IMPORTANCE TO THEM AND OF PRIMARY IMPORTANCE TO US. GENSCHER SAID THAT THIS WAS A POINT HE HAD MADE MORE THAN ONCE IN THE PAST. BUT HE WAS NOT SAYING THAT IT SHOULD BE APPLIED TO THE RESOLUTION NOW UNDER DISCUSSION. THE POINT HAD COME UP IN THE MARGINS OF THE RECENT FRANCO-GERMAN SUMMIT. I SAID THAT IF HE WAS INTERESTED IN COMMON FRANCO-GERMAN DIPLOMATIC POSITIONS, I MUST ADVISE HIM TO LOOK FOR OTHER FIELDS THAN THIS ONE.

5. WE ARE LEAVING WITH THE FEDERAL CHANCELLERY A COPY OF THE PIECE OF PAPER BASED ON YOUR TELNO 160 TO ARIDJAN WHICH WE LEFT AT THE AUSWAERTIGES ANT THIS MORNING.

COMMENT

6. IT SOUNDED TO ME AS IF GENSCHER FELT INHIBITED BY SOME SORT OF UNDERSTANDING ARRIVED AT BETWEEN KOHL AND MITTERPAND. IN VIEW OF KOHL'S CRYPTIC RESPONSE I RECOMMEND A MESSACE TO HIM FROM THE PRIME MINISTER LEAVING NO DOUBT AS TO THE STRENGTH OF OUR FEELINGS.
