TEXT OF MESSAGE FROM THE COMMONWEALTH SECRETARY-GENERAL TO THE RT. HON. MARGARET THATCHER, MP Begins . Dear Prime Minister, With your co-operation and that of the other Commonwealth Heads of Government identified in paragraph 5 of the Nassau Accord on Southern Africa, I have been engaged these last weeks in consultations directed towards constituting the Group of Eminent Persons. The result is I propose to invite Mr. Fraser and General Obasanjo to be Co-Chairmen of the Group. Both have indicated their willingness to serve in this capacity. We are now, therefore, in a position to proceed and I plan to announce the constitution of the Group as set out on Monday, 25 November with an embargo for 1200 hours GMT. In advance of that, I will communicate directly with all Commonwealth Heads of Government telling them of the constitution of the Group and related matters. Please accept my deep gratitude for all the care you have taken over this most important development. I know how much you share my hope that it is one which, taken in the context of the Accord as a whole, will contribute in some measure to the positive resolution of problems in Southern With deep respect, Shridath S. COMMONWEALTH GROUP OF EMINENT PERSONS SET UP TO PROMOTE DIALOGUE FOR DEMOCRACY IN SOUTH AFRICA

The Commonwealth Secretary-General, Mr Shridath Ramphal, announced today the establishment of the Group of Eminent Persons who are to encourage political dialogue in South Africa with a view to establishing a non-racial and representative government. The Group is one of the three central elements of the Accord on Southern Africa agreed by Commonwealth leaders at their Nassau summit last month.

The Secretary-General has constituted the Group on the basis of proposals made by the seven Heads of Government who were asked by their colleagues in Nassau to work with him on the modalities of the effort to assist the process of political dialogue in South Africa; they are the President of Zambia, and the Prime Ministers of Australia, the Bahamas, Britain, Canada, India and Zimbabwe.

Members of the Group are:

Mr Malcolm Fraser (Proposed by Prime Minister Hawke) Former Prime Minister of Australia

General Olusegum Obasanjo (Proposed jointly by President Kaunda and Prime Minister Mugabe with the concurrence of the Government of Nigeria) Former Head of State of Nigeria

Lord Barber of Wentbridge (Proposed by Prime Minister Thatcher) Chairman, Standard Chartered Bank, and former Minister of the Government of the United Kingdom

A President of the World Council of Churches, former President of the World YWCA and Chairperson of the International NGO Women's Forum in Nairobi.

Former Minister of the Government Mr John Malecela of Tanzania (Proposed jointly by President Kaunda and Prime Minister Mugabe with the concurrence of the Government of Tanzania) Former Minister of the Government Sardar Swaran Singh of India. (Proposed by Prime Minister Gandhi) Primate of the Anglican Church Archbishop Edward W Scott of Canada (Proposed by Prime Minister Mulroney) All will serve in their personal capacities. Mr Fraser and General Obasanjo will be Co-Chairmen of the Group. The Group will have its first meeting in London in the first half of December when it is expected to agree upon its method of work and a timetable for the initial six-month period. Special arrangements are being made by the Commonwealth Secretariat to support the work of the Group. The Secretary-General, Mr Ramphal, said today: "I am very pleased to be able to announce the full list of the Group of Eminent Persons which Commonwealth leaders agreed on at Nassau. That it has taken somewhat longer than I originally hoped is indicative of the great care which Commonwealth leaders have taken in ensuring a group of the highest quality and appropriate balance. I am deeply grateful to all those concerned for their readiness to support this most important Commonwealth effort and to give it the best possible chance of fulfilling the objectives of the Commonwealth at Nassau. The members of the Group will be acting on behalf of the Commonwealth as a whole. They will try to advance by all practicable means the objectives Commonwealth leaders expressed collectively in their Accord on Southern Africa. That. Accord provides the framework and the terms of reference for the Group's work." 13

Members of Group of Eminent Persons

Mr Malcolm Fraser, proposed by the Prime Minister of Australia.

Mr Fraser was the Prime Minister of Australia 1975-83, after having held a number of cabinet positions from 1968. He entered parliament in 1955, after graduating from Oxford University in 1952. As Prime Minister, Mr Fraser chaired the Commonwealth summit held in Melbourne in 1981 and was responsible for initiating the series of Commonwealth Heads of Government Regional Meetings for the Asia/Pacific region. Lately an International Fellow of Harvard University, Mr Fraser was Chairman of the United Nations Panel of Eminent Persons which recently reported on the Activities of Transnational Corporations in South Africa and Namibia. He is a member of the Inter Action Council of former Heads of Government formed in 1983. (Co-Chairman)

General Olusegum Obasanjo, proposed by the President of Zambia and the Prime Minister of Zimbabwe, was the head of the Federal Military Government of Nigeria from 1976-79, when he handed over power to an elected civilian government, headed by President Shehu Shagari. A Fellow of the University of Ibadan from 1979, General Obasanjo served on the Independent (Palme) Commission on Disarmament and Security and he is a member of the Inter Action Council of former Heads of Government. As an officer in the Nigerian army which he joined in 1958, he served with the UN forces in Congo in 1960. He served as Federal Commissioner for Works and Housing in 1975 and was promoted Lt-General in 1976. (Co-Chairman).

Lord Barber of Wentbridge, proposed by the Prime Minister of Britain, has been Chairman of the Standard Chartered Bank since 1974. Having served as Economic Secretary to the British Treasury 1959-62, Financial Secretary to the Treasury 1962-63 and Minister of Health 1963-64, Lord Barber was Chancellor of the Exchequer 1970-74. He was Chairman of the Conservative Party 1967-70 and a member of the Falkland Islands Inquiry Committee (Franks Committee) in 1982. A graduate of Oxford University and a barrister, he entered Parliament in 1951.

Dame Nita Barrow, proposed by the Prime Minister of the Bahamas. A Barbadian national; Dame Nita Barrow was President of the World YWCA 1975-83 and has been a President of the World Council of Churches since 1983 and President of the International Council for Adult Education since 1982. She was the convenor of the Non-Governmental Organisations Forum for the World Conference to review the UN Decade for Women held in Nairobi this year. After being Principal Nursing Officer in Jamaica and Nursing Adviser to the Pan American Health Organisation for the Commonwealth Caribbean, she served as Associate Director 1972-75 and Director 1975-81 of the Christian Medical Commission of the World Council of Churches in Geneva. She was made a Dame of St Andrews in 1980.

Mr John Malecela, proposed by the President of Zambia and the Prime Minister of Zimbabwe, was Foreign Minister of Tanzania 1972-75. He later held other positions in the Cabinet (Agriculture 1978-80, Minerals 1980-82, Communications and Transport 1982-84 and Communications and Works 1984-85) until he relinquished office earlier this month. He was Vice-Chairman of the Independent (Maitland) Commission for Worldwide Telecommunications Development. As Tanzania's Permanent Representative at the UN 1964-68, Mr Malecela was elected Chairman of the UN Committee on Decolonisation in 1967. He was a Minister in the East African Community before becoming a Minister in Tanzania in 1972. He studied at the Universities of Bombay and Cambridge.
