SUBJECT CC MASTER.

PRIME MINISTER'S MEETING WITH MR. MABUZA

The Prime Minister had a talk this morning with Mr. Enos Mabuza, Chief Minister of KaNgwane. Mr. Mabuza left the Prime Minister with a memorandum setting out his views. I enclose a copy.

In reply to the Prime Minister's question how a dialogue between the government and black representatives could be initiated, Mr. Mabuza said that the first step was to lift the state of emergency, withdraw the police from the townships and release detainees. The Government must also show itself ready to enter into serious discussion of legitimate grievances. In particular there was an urgent need for reform of the education system. Action here could do much to defuse tensions. The Prime Minister pointed out that this would only be feasible if the South African economy remained strong, which in turn argued against economic sanctions.

Mr. Mabuza agreed that it was important to bring the South African Government to start dialogue soon. Otherwise moderate leaders would steadily lose credibility. In reply to the Prime Minister's question, Mr. Mabuza said that he thought the ANC would be prepared to suspend violence, in effect by declaring a truce. In his view they would not want to fight if negotiation were really an alternative. The Prime Minister urged Mr. Mabuza to join with other moderate leaders such as Chief Butheleze to lay careful groundwork for a dialogue. They should, for instance, work out a list of indispensable participants. Mr. Mabuza thought that this need not number more than twenty, including the leaders of the homelands Chief Butheleze, Bishop Tutu and the Reverend Boesak. He did not appear to think ANC participation vital at the first stage.

The Prime Minister commented afterwards that she was favourably impressed by Mr. Mabuza. He was a cultivated
