

I requested my Minister of Foreign Affairs yesterday to forward to you the text of the Statement to be issued by my Government today embodying my Government's reactions to the Commonwealth communication. In formulating our response, your representations and the strong stand you took against sanctions and against violence perpetrated by the ANC weigh heavily with us as you will no doubt be able to conclude from the wording of the Statement. The Canadian Ambassador accompanied by representatives of the Australian and British Embassies in Pretoria, on the instruction of their Governments, yesterday handed to the South African Government the composition of the proposed Commonwealth Group on South Africa as well as the text of the Commonwealth Accord.

It is obvious that the great majority of Commonwealth members is ill-informed or not informed at all of the South African Government's reform programme and of the current situation in South Africa and southern Africa. Indeed, the Commonwealth Accord of 20 October 1985 takes scant account of the realities of South and southern Africa. The Republic of South Africa is the mainstay of economic progress and stability in southern Africa and therefore, all the leaders of southern Africa ought to resolve their differences peacefully through discussion and not to resort to violence.

The South African Government has nothing to hide. Should the Commonwealth Group be genuinely interested in acquainting themselves with the prevailing circumstances in this country and the southern African region, the progress already made in South Africa as well as the future reform programme envisaged, the South African Government is prepared to consider ways and means of making that possible without conceding the right of intervention in the country's national affairs.
