E OF THE COMMONWEALTH SECRETARY-GENERAL MARLBOROUGH HOUSE · PALL MALL · LONDON SW1Y 5HX 13 December, 1985 Dear Gri Thatcher, I have written separately to Geoffrey Howe this afternoon (as well as to the Australian and Canadian High Commissioners) in terms of the attached letter, requesting HMG's assistance in transmitting a message from the Group of Eminent Persons to the State President in South Africa. The Group wish me to make a copy of this available to you directly and by the first opportunity. They also wish me to convey on their behalf their deep appreciation of the opportunity for meeting with you today and to say how much they valued the discussion they had at No. 10. I am sure you would be pleased to know that the Group has made an excellent start in its own deliberations; that they are approaching the enormously difficult task ahead in an extremely positive manner and that this first meeting has demonstrated, as I am sure their visit to No. 10 would have shown, how very quickly they have established a group relationship. Given their collective commitment to further the purposes that you and your colleagues envisaged for them in Nassau, I believe you can be assured that everything possible is being done on the part of the Commonwealth to make this effort a success. Much, of course, depends on the co-operation of others and here we shall continue to need the British Government's assistance in encouraging a positive climate in Pretoria. Other Commonwealth Governments are assisting in promoting such a climate among other parties. We must all hope that these efforts succeed in what increasingly looks like the limited time we have available for promoting a just settlement by peaceful means in South Africa. Dethe dæpreged. The Group of Eminent Persons constituted under the Nassau Accord on Southern Africa has just completed its first meeting here in Marlborough House. They have agreed to send to HE The State President of South Africa a letter signed by the two Co-Chairmen of the Group intimating their wish to visit South Africa at an early date in pursuance of their mandate and inviting the co-operation of the authorities in Pretoria for this purpose. They have agreed that I should invite the Governments of Australia, Britain and Canada through your Embassies in Pretoria to convey this letter and I write to do so, enclosing the original letter. I should be most grateful if, on behalf of the Group, the three Missions in Pretoria could co-ordinate their action to ensure delivery of the message to the State President at the earliest possible opportunity. On the assumption that it should be possible for this to be done on Monday next I am, at the request of the Group, making a copy of it available directly to the South African Embassy in London on Monday, with an indication that it is being formally transmitted in Pretoria by the three Commonwealth Missions. It is the specific wish of the Group that I should invite all three Governments to use their good offices and influence with the authorities in Pretoria to encourage an early and positive response to their letter. They are most anxious to avoid a protracted process of correspondence with regard to details and feel very keenly the importance of their meeting with the South African Government as early as possible. I am sure you will agree that there is very good reason for avoiding such a process and on the Group's behalf I invite your assistance in your Government's contacts with Pretoria. Shridath S.
