SOUTH AFRICA

The South African Ambassador has sent down the attached text of a statement by President Botha. He was particularly anxious that you should see it. It does not seem to me very helpful, rather the reverse. Dr. Worrall added that the South African Government realised the importance of achieving some positive developments before the meeting of Commonwealth Heads of Government in August. I said that I was glad to hear this. I knew that you attached particular importance to the position of Mr. Mandela. Dr. Worrall said that this point was well taken, but his release would need to be carefully handled, with clear understandings about what would happen after it. I said that I thought you saw the necessity for this. I urged Dr. Worrall to stay in touch discreetly.

I am not passing this on to the Foreign Office.

THE STATE PRESIDENT'S TELEVISION STATEMENT OF 12 JUNE 1986 REGARDING THE DECLARATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY

"THERE ARE TIMES IN THE HISTORY OF NATIONS WHEN A CHOICE BETWEEN UNPLEASANT ALTERNATIVES IS INEVITABLE.

THE CHOICE BETWEEN WAR AND A DISHONOURABLE, FEARFUL PEACE IS SUCH AN EXAMPLE.

THE DECISION TO ANNOUNCE A STATE OF EMERGENCY, AS I HAVE DONE TODAY, ALSO REPRESENTS SUCH A CHOICE.

I REALISE THAT THERE IS CONCERN IN THE HEARTS OF SOUTH AFRICANS ABOUT THE CONDITIONS IN OUR COUNTRY, AS WELL AS THE INTERNATIONAL THREAT OF SANCTIONS AGAINST OUR COUNTRY.

I NOW WISH TO SHARE WITH YOU MY VIEWS ON THE CIRCUMSTANCES _ WITH WHICH WE HAVE TO CONTEND AND HOW WE ARE GOING TO DEAL WITH THEM.

THE SECURITY FORCES ARE THE FRIENDS OF EACH PEACE-LOVING AND LAW-ABIDING CITIZEN OF THIS COUNTRY.

THE GOVERNMENT EXPECTS OF THEM TO, AL ALL TIMES, ACT IN SUCH A WAY THAT THERE COULD BE NO DOUBT ABOUT THIS.

IT IS HOWEVER ALSO THEIR RESPONSIBILITY TO ENFORCE THE LAW, TO MAINTAIN PUBLIC ORDER AND TO PROTECT LIVES AND PROPERTY.

THE GOVERNMENT IS AWARE OF THE FACT THAT THEY SOMETIMES HAVE TO PERFORM THIS TASK UNDER EXTREME PROVOCATION, IN DANGER OF THEIR LIVES AND UNDER THE MOST DIFFICULT CIRCUMSTANCES CONCEIVABLE.

SOUTH AFRICA DEEPLY APPRECIATES WHAT THEY ARE DOING AND THEY ENJOY OUR FULL SUPPORT IN THE EXECUTION O THEIR TASK TO EXTERMINATE UTTERLY VIOLENCE AND LAWLESSNESS IN THE INTEREST OF LAW-ABIDING PEOPLE OF PEACE OF ALL POPULATION GROUPS.

THE GOVERNMENT REMAINS COMMITTED TO REFORM, BUT WILL DO ONE THING AND NOT NEGLECT THE OTHER.

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WE DESERVE ENCOURAGEMENT AND UNDERSTANDING - NOT PUNISHMENT OF ANY SORT.

COMMITTED AS WE ARE TO PEACE AND NORMAL INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS, THE WORLD MUST TAKE NOTE AND NEVER FORGET THAT WE ARE NOT A NATION OF WEAKLINGS.

WE DO NOT DESIRE IT AND WE DO NOT SEEK IT, BUT IF WE ARE FOCED TO GO IT ALONE, THEN SO BE IT.

IF THIS WERE TO HAPPEN, IT MUST NOT BE EXPECTED OF US TO BE PARTISAN. WE WILL INSIST ON BEING NEATRAL IN MATTERS OF AN INTERNATIONAL NATURE AND WE WILL TRADE WITH HOSE COUNTRIES WHICH DO NOT ALLOW IDEOLOGICAL DIFFERENCES TO INFLUENCE ECONOMIC RELATIONS.

TO ALL SOUTH AFRICANS I SAY THIS: WE HAVE THE CAPACITY AND THE FAITH TO BUILD A GREAT AND PROSPEROUS NATION.


