Dear Prime Minister

You already know my view on apartheid in South Africa - they are diametrically opposed to yours.

You also know that I recognise the circumstances which militate against your adopting my views.

I wish at this point however, to re-emphasise the conditions which I believe must be established for the complete shut down and isolation of South Africa - that the Front Line States and our black people in South Africa must request this action.

Though I have never before explicitly put it in words - such a request must necessarily be accompanied by action on their part to make my plan work.

I was therefore, extremely shocked and disillusioned to find that Zimbabwe had recently entered into an agreement with South Africa.

I am writing this to ensure that you realise that I have not changed my mind as to the only action which I beleive will abolish apartheid but that I have an even greater understanding of your position and the circumstances which force you to take the stand that you have taken - your sincere belief that sanctions will hurt the very people that we all wish to assist.

I, of course, feel that it is better to have a short and very painful period than a long drawn-out better soul-destroying confrontation.

One Front Line State apparently does not agree with me.
