There will be a great deal of press coverage of the IGCs in the run-up to the European Council, and considerable interest in the British position. The Foreign Secretary will be placing a number of articles on specific subjects and targeted at specific audiences in the European press during November. He and Mr Garel-Jones will also take opportunities to place written and other interviews in the press largely in connection with their visits abroad. In addition to this, the Foreign Secretary believes it would be useful if an article by the Prime Minister could be placed in as many newspapers as possible in all other member states in the week before the European Council. This could be a crystallised version of the Prime Minister's opening speech in the House of Commons debate (which will itself be reported in Europe), suitably edited and put into article form. 
Important issues are at stake in the present negotiations. It is right that they should be debated.

I shall listen carefully to all the views that are put forward. At Maastricht I shall make a judgement in the interests of this country and our continuing role as a leader of the Community. It is only this Government which has the policies to promote Britain's interests in the European Community.
