ec Blip 27 November 1986 PRIME MINISTER Television News BBC and ITN Recently I spent two evenings observing the production of television news at the BBC (The Six O'Clock News) and ITN (News at Ten). In both cases I attended the editorial conferences before the news was written, and then attended the informal de-briefing following the news itself. I came away with some clear impressions. Organizational Structure The most obvious difference was between the management structures of the two organisations. BBC TV News is a small corner of a huge department store, while ITN is a highly specialised boutique. ITN has a very simple and clear management structure (Chart 1). The Chief Executive (David Nicholas) sits on the main board and is directly answerable for all ITN operations (news, staff, property, product development) to the board. The editors of the four daily news programmes (1 o'clock, 5.45, Channel Four and News at Ten) report to him directly. By contrast the Editor of BBC TV News is directly accountable to no less than six different people (Chart 2): Director General and - overall performance Deputy D.G. - overall finance, Managing Director BBC TV staffing, unions

-2-Director of Programmes BBC TV - quality of programmes (balance of views) - sensitive matters Assistant D.G. - political matters Chief Asst to D.G. (domestic politics, N. Ireland) - capital spending Chairman, Development Cttee In addition to this the Editor of News sits ex-officio on a large number of inter-departmental committees - 7 of which meet every week and another 2 to 3 of which meet in addition every other week. Under the present structure the Editor has very little if any incentive to be enterprising e.g. by selling the news abroad, developing new products etc. The contract with Visnews in particular needs looking into. Writing the News ITN news has always been presented and written by journalists. Newsreaders typically write the headlines and 2-3 items each for the particular programme they are presenting. By contrast BBC News has traditionally been presented by actors/actresses but written by journalists. As a result ITN has attracted senior journalists as newsreaders (Alastair Burnet, Sandy Gall), whereas comparable individuals in the BBC have ended up in Current Affairs (David Dimbleby, Michael Charlton, Robin Day, Peter Snow).
