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PRIME MINISTER'S MEETING WITH BROADCASTERS

As your letter of 6 July records, it was agreed at the recent meeting between the Home Secretary and the Prime Minister that we would offer some suggestions of people whom the Prime Minister might get together for an informal discussion about the future prospects for the broadcasting world, in the light in particular of prospective technological developments.

I attach a list of people who because of their present positions and past experience should provide between them a wide range of experience and outlook on broadcasting matters. We have aimed to include people who, taken together, have knowledge of the BBC, ITV, Channel 4, independent productions, the prospective DBS service and non-DBS satellite services as well as cable.

Inevitably, I fear, most have a vested interest of some sort. But we have also included one or two names of people who, while not professionally engaged in broadcasting, are well informed observers of it, including Sir Alan Peacock (who needs no introduction), Mr Ray Snoddy (perhaps the leading specialist journalist), and Mr Charles Jonscher who took the leading part in our recent consultancy on subscription.
