

1987 SURVEY: SOCIAL SECURITY - INCOME-RELATED BENEFITS 29/

1. The Prime Minister will today have received a copy of a letter from the Secretary of State for Social Services outlining the agreement which he has reached with the Chief Secretary on income-related benefits in this year's PES.

- 2. As the letter indicates Mr Moore faces a difficult timetable. He is convinced that he must begin his statutory consultation with local authorities in the week beginning 12 October before Parliament returns, and announce his final decision in the week beginning 2 November. Information about the proposed new rates may well leak to the press soon after consultations begin and create immediate controversy; so that Mr Moore may well come under pressure to make a statement soon after Parliament resumes. And he will have to make a number of other announcements early in the session, for instance about the freezing of child benefit and the introduction of the new Social Security Bill, which may also lead to controversy. It is also possible that discussions about the Health programme, not yet settled in PES, may lead to difficult decisions which will have to be announced around the time of the Autumn Statement.
- 3. The Lord President thinks that in the circumstances it would be wise to hold a small meeting at an early date of Ministers and business managers himself, Mr Moore, the Chief Secretary, the Lord Privy Seal and the Chief Whip to go over the ground and consider how these announcements should be handled. Unless the Prime Minister wishes to take the meeting, he would propose to chair it himself. I would be grateful if you would let me know whether she would be content with this.
