PRIME MINISTER The Home Secretary has asked for your views on the attached letter about the concessionary television licence scheme. The existing scheme provides colour TV licences for 5p per year for pensioners, disabled and mentally disordered persons in residential care or living in specially provided accommodation run by a local authority or housing association. It has been recognised as anomalous for a long time, but the issue has been brought to a head by a court decision that local authorities could bring within the scope of the scheme all old age pensioners living in council houses in their areas. This would result in up to £1.7 million pensioners households becoming eligible at a cost, in lost revenue, of some £100 million per year. The Home Secretary is proposing to restrict the scheme by defining more closely the accommodation that may qualify and restricting it to public sector housing. He proposes to protect the position of existing beneficiaries and to increase the concessionary sum from 5p to £5, while introducing a pay as you go scheme.
