## GAELIC TELEVISION SERVICES

One of the loose ends left over from the recent broadcasting announcements is the plans for Gaelic television. Malcolm Rifkind's minute at <u>Flag A</u> now sets out his proposals. These involve:

- a statutory requirement to broadcast Gaelic programmes on some C3 licences, with a substantial expansion from present provision;
- compulsory financing from the franchise revenue of C3 stations, perhaps in the order of £8 million.

Mr. Rifkind seeks agreement to "float these ideas" on 11 July.

The Chancellor has now commented at <u>Flag B</u>, strongly resisting the proposals. He argues that:

- the White Paper gave no indication the Government would extend such subsidised viewing to other minority groups;
- television companies should not be required by regulation or encouraged by subsidy to provide Gaelic programming;
- franchise revenue should be a part of general Government revenue, not a special fund for broadcasting;
- if a case can be made for subsidising the market to provide Gaelic broadcasting the funding should come from the Scottish block budget;
- the idea should not be floated next week.

- 2 -The Home Secretary (Flag C) suggests that more time is needed to consider these proposals, and that no short term announcement should therefore be made.
