NEWS FOR CHANNELS 3, 4 AND 5

Thank you for your letter of 7 August recording the Prime Minister's view that it would not be right to insist on a requirement on the new Channel 3 licensees to show high quality regional news.

The Home Secretary takes the point that it might not always be easy to judge whether news was of the requisite high quality, although the Government is already committed by the Broadcasting White Paper to a requirement on Channel 3 licensees to show high quality news and current affairs programmes dealing with national and international matters. He also understands the general argument against adding further specific requirements on licensees at this stage.

The Home Secretary's concern is that if the Bill were, in effect, to indicate that a lower standard of provision was acceptable in relation to regional, as against national, news, there would be a risk that licensees would consciously cut back on the resources devoted to it, particularly since regional programming is one area in which Channel 3 will face no real competition from any other television channel. This, he thinks, will be a matter on which many backbenchers will have strong views. More generally, any suggestion that the Government attaches lesser significance to regional than to national news may be seized upon by the Opposition as calling into question the strength of our commitment to a regional structure for Channel 3.

Despite these reservations, however, the Home Secretary would be content not to press the requirement for high quality regional news, but to wait to see how the argument develops once the Bill is introduced. If Parliamentary pressure on this point builds up, he may wish to return to the matter later, when it may be helpful to have this potential concession available, if necessary.
