#### Budget

- EC says there should not be a restrictive budget next week.
- Beckett doesn't see oil price fall as a reason for being restrictive and adds that state of economy may make it impossible for employers to give adequate support to youth training scheme.
- Guardian weighs in on the side of a reflationary budget and says it is only common sense and logical.

- Multinational companies warn they will consider moving their operations abroad if Budget contained proposed legislation on international tax avoidance.
- RSPCA want increase in dog licence.

## EC

- Britain to pay through the nose this year, according to <u>D/Star</u> White Paper estimates out net contribution at £622m compared with £55m this year.
- Seen as underlining need for urgent reform of Euro Budget.
- <u>Sun</u>: Eurocrats want us to pay a bigger rise to make French farmers fatter you must tell Europe not bloody likely.
- Mirror: the disclosure could seriously disrupt the Chancellor's Budget plans.

- Dispute over warnings given to shop stewards caught in canteen having a cuppa hits 3 Sunderland shipyards want final warnings withdrawn.
