Cricket

3 year test ban on English Tourists for South Africa, and they will not be selected to play for their counties against the Indians and Pakistanis this summer.

Government believed to have breathed a sigh of relief, especially in view of Mrs. Gandhi's visit next week; players stunned - may sue for restraint of trade.

Guardian says that if the cricketers are shocked by the severity of the TTCB they are more naive than previously appeared.

Economy

Last month prices remained stable for the first time for 12 years. Rate of inflation falls 1%. Several papers hail this as a big boost for you and the Government. Guardian forecasts single figure inflatio in 2 months. Norman Tebbit says common sense is breaking out all over the country.

Express says the movement of inflation is further confirmation that the general course of your policy is correct and beginning to succeed; common sense is beginning to pay economic and political dividends.

Mail: springtime for Maggie; this is not a flash in the pan, and productivity is growing impressively; British economy seems to be moving into a virtuous circle; the prospects should put a spring into your step and give a boost to the rest of us.

OPEC agrees to limit production, but there are serious doubts whether it will have any effect on actual supplies.

Three jailers acquitted of murder of prisoner need police protection to get through howling mod at Leicester.

Chief Constable Anderton's problems with his police committee deepen - they refuse him vote of confidence.

Politics

Times senses success for Mr. Jenkins in Hillhead on the basis of his reports of house to house visits.

Bryant Godman-Irvine, MP for Rye, to stand down at next election.

Mr. Heath on the plane from Leeds/Bradford which narrowly missed two Dutch military planes.

John Hoyskins' decision to leave reported flatly.

International

El Salvador. The storm breaks over the death of the 4 Dutch TV journalists - Dutch Foreign Minister says they could have been murdered in cold blood, and sends his Ambassador to Mexico to investigate; USA acknowledges that the ruling junta's account of their deaths seriously undermines Reagan's support.

Nicaragua accuses the USA of plotting to invade.

USA: only 43% compared with 67% last April now approves President Reagan's performance.

South Africa: Botha accepts an invitation to talks by Kaunda.

Denmark: hit by foot and mouth disease outbreak.

Elections: second round of French cantonal elections tomorrow when Lower Saxony also goes to the polls.

Buckley Mission: Times says this came to a dismal end in Brussels with little indication that Europe is prepared to take a tougher line against Russia.

Penlee: inquest jury lay blame for the tragedy on the skipper of the Union Star which foundered in the gale.

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
