However, I cannot agree that, in the event of the plans having to be implemented, such financial provision as may prove necessary should be found from the Contingency Reserve. I am conscious that the programmes for which you are responsible will total some £1.6 billion in the new financial year, and I find it hard to accept that the cost of a sea service for the Falklands (even if it were to exceed the £1.5 million annual cost of the service to St Helena as your officials expect) could not be accommodated within these programmes. Before 1982-83 has even begun, I should have thought there must be sufficient flegibility in your programmes to absorb relatively small claims of this kind.

If extra costs were incurred in order to keep Endurance in the Falklands (as proposed in your letter of 24 March to John Nott) these costs should be met without recourse to the Contingency Reserve.

I am copying this letter to the Prime Minister and other members of OD, to the Secretary of State for Energy, the Attorney-General and Sir Robert Armstrong.
