The Prime Minister left No 10 at 7.00 am for Northolt and Brussels where she is attending the European Council today and tomorrow.

At 10.30 am European Council members will meet the King of the Belgians at the Palais des Academies. There will be speeches from King Baudouin and the Presidents of the European Parliament, Council, Commission and Court of Justice.

Afterwards the Council members will attend a lunch hosted by the King at the Palais Royal, before opening session in the Charlemagne Building. The session is due to end at 7.00 pm.

ANSWERS OF INTEREST

No 135 Written 3.30 pm: Mr John Lee to ask S/S Education if he will now publish a document on the reform of school examinations at 16 plus. (The answer will draw attention to the draft document sent to interested bodies for comment. Sir Keith Joseph will make this issue the main theme of his address to the Secondary Heads Association today.)

No 128 Written 3.30 pm: Mr Martin Stevens to ask S/S Energy whether the gas and electricity industries have yet reported to him the results of their consideration of the review by the Policy Studies Institute of the Industries' code of practice on the payment of bills and if he will make a statement. (Answer will welcome the report and will note that the Department has obtained their agreement to some improving amendments.)

He had not made up his mind but our personal guess was that he would not change the Bill: a great deal of thought and consultation had gone into the Bill and therefore we thought it unlikely changes would be made at this stage. Nevertheless Mr Tebbit's mind was not totally made up.
