Leader & OPERATIONS ON AND AROUND SOUTH GEORGIA =

Points to Make in any Briefing

- 1. Ministers are in political control of the task force and operational orders given to it but the conduct of any operation is a matter for the military on the spot. That cannot be controlled from 8,000 miles distance. Ministers are kept fully in touch with what is going on.
- It is perfectly legitimate not to say when any orders were given until such time as we choose to release this information. We must never forget that lives might be at stake and other. related operations could be affected.
- 3. It can be assumed that Ministers were aware of the events concerning South Georgia and Cabinet was fully briefed on Thursday as matters stood at that time. They were aware that the force was off South Georgia and Ministers knew its objectives.

## IF ASKED IF WE TOLD THE AMERICANS OF OUR INTENTIONS

The Americans were well aware from what we had said directly to them and what had been said publicly by Ministers in Parliament that the use of force could not be ruled out. It can be assumed that once the operation was underway that we kept them informed .-
