On the suggestion that reserve powers of legislation be created for the Governor, the strongest contrary arguments, to my mind, are that this would be seen as a declaration of no confidence in the elected legislature we are about to set up and, above all, that it would give the Chinese a precedent for giving the same powers to the Chief Executive after 1997. On the power of dissolution, it is true that such a provision might also be used as a precedent by the Chinese. But this should not be dangerous provided that the power was firmly coupled, as it would be in this case, with a requirement to hold fresh elections within a specified period.
