The December issue of British Overseas Development (enclosed) includes a front page statement from me about the importance of forestry and how we propose to take the Prime Minister's initiative forward. The statement also serves to introduce the forestry supplement which describes our current activities. Specific action in hand includes:-A review of our bilateral country programmes to identify a selected number which we should target for additional forestry commitments. The countries are likely to be ones with significant needs and interest, where we have major aid programmes and relevant expertise. I expect the process of identification to be completed by the end of January; (ii) More support for forestry research. I addressed an international conference on international forestry research, which we helped to host at Wilton Park, on 1 December, (copy attached at A). The conference led to clearer ideas of how the donor community should help strengthen developing country national research capacity. We have set aside an additional £0.5 million a year from next April to support further forestry research efforts which is an area where Britain has considerable expertise; (iii) Encouraging British charities to put forward more forestry projects. I expect to decide shortly to increase our funding of British charities, including a block grant of fl million a year to the World Wide Fund for Nature primarily for their forestry activities; /(iv)

- (iv) Strengthening our access to forestry expertise so that we are fully prepared to handle the new commitments which will include an emphasis on training and institution building.
- 4. I plan to let you have a further progress report in February. In the meantime you may wish to advise the Prime Minister of the work in hand.
