OZONE CONFERENCE: ASSISTING DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

I am replying to your letter of 21 February to Geoffrey Howe and which you kindly copied to me, accompanied by a draft policy statement for the UK to issue at the above Conference, on the provision of assistance to developing countries.

I am content with the statement as it stands. I can see that there may be criticism from some quarters that the UK is not offering enough but so far as this Department's interests are concerned, I believe that we must necessarily proceed with caution. We cannot expect our industries to give anything away in terms of prices or transfer of technology on other than commercial terms - this would remove the motivation to invest in developing the safer substances which should help solve the problem.

Neither do I see any scope, as far as the Aid and Trade Provision is concerned, for focussing aid on CFC-related projects. Its role is essentially to support the export of UK goods and services. If developing countries call for tenders for CFC-related projects and UK companies seek assistance in responding to those calls, such requests will be treated - like any others - in the light of their industrial and commercial significance to the UK. But developing countries must be persuaded of the need to view such projects as a priority - which of course will be one of the functions of the Conference.
