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Visit of US Ambassador to the United Nations: 9 April London

We have heard from the American Embassy that the American Ambassador to the United Nations, Mrs Jeane Kirkpatrick, will be in London on 9 April to give a lunchtime address at Chatham House on 'the state of the US dialogue with Europe' and give a talk in the afternoon to the Institute for European and Defence Studies on 'US global priorities and objectives'. She has asked whether she might call on the Prime Minister.

The Foreign Secretary certainly does not want to press this, but thinks - but only of course if she can spare the time without too much difficulty - that the Prime Minister might find it interesting to talk to Mrs Kirkpatrick. As you know she holds Cabinet rank. Apart from her views on Central America and Argentina, which are well known, Mrs Kirkpatrick is an important influence in Republican circles, especially among the ''New Right''. She would be able to give an interesting slant on US foreign policy and more specifically on relations between the United States and Europe.

In the absence of the Foreign Secretary at a meeting of the Foreign Affairs Council, Lady Young will offer to see Mrs Kirkpatrick.

A personality note on Mrs Kirkpatrick is attached.

Born in Duncan, Ohio in 1926. Graduated from Stephens College and Barnard College then earned her MA and PhD in Political Science from Columbia University. From 1950-51 she studied at the Institut de Sciences Politiques in Paris and for six months in 1970 she was a professional lecturer at the Institut for American Universities at the University of Aix-Marseilles, Aix-en-Provence. Mrs Kirkpatrick speaks fluent French and Spanish.

From 1962-70, Mrs Kirkpatrick was Assistant Professor at Trinity College in Washington DC. She was awarded a grant for research on political conventions and women in American politics (1973-74). From 1975-78 she was active in Democratic Party politics as co-Vice Chairman of the coalition for a Democratic majority, and as a member of the Democratic National Convention's National Commission on Party structure and Presidential nomination (the Winograd Commission). In 1978 she became a Leavey University Professor at Georgetown University, where she was also serving as Professor in the Department of Government.

Jeane Kirkpatrick is a life-long Democrat but during the 1980
Presidential campaign she expressed her disillusionment with
Democratic foreign policy in a magazine article which attracted
President Reagan's attention and secured her a place as one of
his foreign policy advisers. On 4 February 1984 she was sworn
in as Permanent Representative to the United Nations - a post
holding Cabinet rank. While recognising the Organization's
many shortcomings, Mrs Kirkpatrick does not advocate US withdrawal
from the UN; rather, the US should be working to improve the way the
UN operates.

Mrs Kirkpatrick believes that the US should have friendly dealings with "moderately authoritarian" regimes in Latin America and not align itself with their Communist opponents through a misguided preoccupation with human rights. She considered that the US should have remained neutral in the Falklands dispute, and tried unsuccessfully to persuade President Reagan and National Security

Adviser Clark that this would be the best course.

Married to Evron M Kirkpatrick, Executive Director of the American Political Science Association. They have three sons.
