## European City of Culture: Athens 1985

Thank you for your letter of 22 October with which you enclosed a letter from Mr Papandreou inviting the Prime Minister to attend the inauguration ceremonies, in June 1985, of Athens' time as the European City of Culture.

The Greeks are getting out well ahead of their Community partners over this scheme, which has its origins in a Greek suggestion, made at the first informal meeting of Community Ministers of Culture in Athens last November, that each year a European city should be designated as European City of Culture, starting with Athens in 1984 (now 1985). Contrary to what the Greeks like to suggest, this idea has never been formally endorsed by EC Culture Ministers nor has it been substantively discussed by them.

At the October Foreign Affairs Council the Greek Minister Pangalos made a statement under other business inviting Foreign Ministers to attend the inauguration ceremonies. We consider that the precedent which would be set by attendance by the Prime Minister or Foreign Secretary on this first occasion would make it difficult to decline subsequent requests from other partners; and there may in addition be a further risk of a de facto parallel "cultural presidency" developing out of such high level gatherings, which quite apart from increased calls on Ministerial time and travel could open the way to considerable confusion or duplication within the Community.

We accordingly recommend that the Prime Minister should send a low key non-committal, reply. I enclose a draft. We intend to ask for discussion of this matter at the 22 November meeting of EC Culture Ministers, when Lord Gowrie might sound out his colleagues' attitudes to the Greek invitation.
