
You may wish to inform the Prime Minister that Mr St John Stevas has agreed to take on this task.

Unfortunately, Sir William has declined to accept Mansell our invitation, in view of his other commitments this autumn. It has proved difficult to identify alternative candidates with the right combination of political standing and cultural distinction. With the Forum only six months away the appointment of a leader We don't is now a matter of some urgency. After considerable thought the Foreign Secretary has concluded that want too the choice must be made from the following three high a candidates.

He considers the front runners to be Lord Harewood and Mr Norman St John Stevas. The former has arguably the stronger claim. He has clear strengths, and his royal connections would lend weight as well as distinction to the UK delegation.

Mr St John Stevas also has a number of evident qualifications for the task. The Foreign Secretary realises however that the Prime Minister may prefer to avoid choosing a member of the House of Commons. If we were to approach Mr St John Stevas we would in any case have to point out our intention to emphasise his status as a leading cultural personality, for which the Budapest Mandate makes provision, rather than his status as a Parliamentarian: CSCE follow up takes place on a confidential government-to-government basis, and the inclusion of Parliamentarians in CSCE delegations has presented difficulty in the past.

The Foreign Secretary would add as the dark horse Lord Thomas. His qualities are undoubted, but there is perhaps some room for doubt as to his suitability for a position as team leader.

Should the Prime Minister not feel attracted by any of these possibilities, then it would in the Foreign Secretary's view be best - given the urgency of the situation - to appoint as leader the present deputy leader, Mr Gerard Mansell. We consider Mr Mansell to be astute and knowledgeable. He has a world-wide reputation, is both interested and enthusiastic about his present appointment, and is prepared to stay in Budapest throughout the six weeks of the Forum, thus providing valuable continuity. Should the Prime Minister consider him an appropriate leader of the UK delegation our intention would be to nominate as deputy leader an FCO official. Our partners in the Ten appear to be veering towards appointing officials rather than culutral personalities to play the leading role in their delegations. We have stated our firm intention to allow cultural personalities to lead, but have emphasised that officials would have an important back-up role. I enclose the formal report on the Preparatory Meeting of Experts which was held in Budapest from 21 November to 4 December in order to prepare the Cultural Forum. PREPARATORY MEETING Budapest, 4 December 1984 Original: ENGLISH REPORT OF THE MEETING OF EXPERTS REPRESENTING THE PARTICIPATING STATES OF THE CONFERENCE ON SECURITY AND CO-OPERATION IN EUROPE, FORESEEN BY THE CONCLUDING DOCUMENT OF THE MADRID MEETING, TO PREPARE THE "CULTURAL FORUM" In accordance with the relevant provisions of the Concluding Document of the Madrid Meeting of Representatives of the participating States of the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europe (CSCE), the meeting of experts representing the participating States, foreseen by the abovementioned Concluding Document, took place in Budapest, at the invitation of the Government of Hungary, from 21 November to 4 December 1984, in order to prepare the "Cultural Forum". During the opening session of the meeting the participants were welcomed by the Secretary of State of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Mr. János Nagy, on behalf of the Government of Hungary. The meeting of experts has reached the following conclusions and drawn up recommendations concerning the agenda, the organizational framework and other modalities of the "Cultural Forum": The "Cultural Forum" will be held in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Final Act of the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europe and in conformity with the mandate provided for by the Concluding Document of the Madrid Meeting and will be attended by leading personalities in the field of culture from the participating States. I. AGENDA

- Formal opening of the "Cultural Forum";
 Address by a representative of the host country.
- Opening statements by representatives of the participating States; Presentation of the views of UNESCO by a representative of that organization.
- 3. Discussion of interrelated problems concerning creation, dissemination and co-operation, including the promotion and expansion of contacts and exchanges in the different fields of culture.

The discussion of the above-mentioned interrelated problems will be conducted in a structured and balanced way in the context of the following fields:

- Plastic and Applied Arts

painting, graphic and photographic arts, sculpture, design, architecture, preservation of cultural and historical monuments;

- Performing Arts

theatre, dance, folklore, music, film, cultural programmes on radio and television;

- Literature

literature, publishing and translation, including reference to less widely spoken languages of the participating States;

- Mutual Cultural Knowledge

research, training and education in the arts, libraries, cultural heritage, preservation of and respect for the diversity and originality of the cultures of the participating States, museums, exhibitions.

- 4. Drawing up of conclusions of the "Cultural Forum".
- 5. Formal closure of the "Cultural Forum".

II. ORGANIZATIONAL FRAMEWORK AND OTHER MODALITIES

- 1. The "Cultural Forum" will open on Tuesday, 15 October 1985, at 10.00 a.m. in Budapest, Hungary. It will close on Monday, 25 November 1985.
- 2. Agenda items 1, 2 and 5 will be dealt with in open plenary meetings.
- 3. Agenda item 3 will be dealt with in the Plenary, which is the main body of the "Forum", and in the subsidiary working bodies on Plastic and Applied Arts, Performing Arts, Literature and Mutual Cultural Knowledge respectively.
- 4. Agenda item 4 will be dealt with in the Plenary.
- 5. The time-table of the "Forum" will be the following:

 The first week beginning on Tuesday, 15 October and ending on Friday,

 18 October 1985, will be devoted to opening statements by representatives
 of those participating States which so desire, in an order decided by
 lot in advance. The opening statements should, as a rule, not exceed

 15 minutes per delegation.

Following the opening statements and the contribution by UNESCO, the discussion under Agenda item 3 will begin with a general debate in the Plenary for the purpose of initiating the work of the subsidiary working bodies.

- Beginning on Monday, 21 October and ending on Friday, 1 November 1985, the two subsidiary working bodies on Plastic and Applied Arts and on Performing Arts respectively, will meet concurrently.

The subsidiary working body on Plastic and Applied Arts will devote its first week to discussing painting, graphic and photographic arts, sculpture, and its second week to discussing design, architecture, preservation of cultural and historical monuments.

The subsidiary working body on Performing Arts will devote its first week to discussing theatre, dance, folklore, music, and its second week to discussing film, cultural programmes on radio and television.

- Beginning on Monday, 4 November and ending on Friday, 15 November 1985, the two subsidiary working bodies on Literature and on Mutual Cultural Knowledge respectively, will meet concurrently.

The subsidiary working body on Literature will devote its two weeks to discussing literature, publishing and translation, including reference to less widely spoken languages of the participating States.

The subsidiary working body on Mutual Cultural Knowledge will devote its first week to discussing research, training and education in the arts, libraries, and its second week to discussing cultural heritage, preservation of and respect for the diversity and originality of the cultures of the participating States, museums, exhibitions.

- The last week beginning on Monday, 18 November and ending on Monday, 25 November 1985, will be devoted to Agenda items 4 and 5.
- 6. Presentation of proposals under Agenda item 3 will take place in the Plenary or in the appropriate subsidiary working body.
- 7. Meetings of the Plenary and of the subsidiary working bodies will be held according to the work programme attached to this document as an annex.
- 8. The Chair at the opening and closing plenary meetings will be taken by a representative of Hungary. After the opening meeting, the Chair will be taken in daily rotation, in French alphabetical order, starting with a representative of HUNGARY.

CSCE/CFB/PM/Dec.2. - 5 -The Chair at the opening sessions of the subsidiary working bodies will 9. be taken by a representative of Hungary. Selection of the successive chairmen by lot will then ensure daily rotation of the Chair, in French alphabetical order, among the representatives of the participating States. In conformity with paragraph 74 of the Final Recommendations of the 10. Helsinki Consultations, the Government of Hungary has designated an Executive Secretary and this designation has been agreed to by the participating States. The other rules of procedure, the working methods and the scale of 11. distribution of the expenses of the CSCE will, mutatis mutandis, be applied to the "Forum". 4 December 1984 Budapest,
