PRIME MINISTER'S MEETING WITH M. CHIRAC

The French Ambassador came to see me yesterday to say that M. Chirac would very much like to take up the Prime Minister's invitation to an early, informal, meeting. He wondered whether Saturday, 26 April, would be convenient.

I have told the Ambassador that the Prime Minister would be very happy to see M. Chirac that day, and to offer him lunch at Chequers. Her preference would be for a meeting on the pattern of that which she had with M. Fabius last summer, that is, just the two of them over an informal lunch with a notetaker each. The Ambassador said that he thought that would also be M. Chirac's preference.

I should be grateful if the Department could pursue the practical arrangements with the French Embassy. Since the Prime Minister will be flying down from Scotland earlier that morning, I suggest that M. Chirac should arrive at 1230 and depart after lunch at about 1500. He will presumably fly into either Northolt or RAF Benson. If possible he should be met by a Foreign Office Minister.

It would be helpful to have briefing by Thursday, 24 April. This need not be lengthy.




