As you know I have just returned from a visit to Greece to celebrate on behalf of the United Kingdom the Centenary of the British School in Athens.

While in Athens I took the opportunity to meet the President of the Parliament and the President of the Republic. I enclose our Ambassador's note of the meeting with Sartzetakis.

In the light of the approaching meetings with the Turks about their relations with the Common Market, I think by way of sounding a note of caution that I should make you aware of the extent of the suspicions of Turkey amongst senior Greek figures and their real apprehensions about Turkey's future intentions towards them. Turkey is a nation of 50 million with a long history of oppressing the Greeks (who number less than 10 million and of acts of aggression toward them. I hold absolutely no brief whatsoever for PASOK but from what I observed there is no doubt that on the Turkish issue Alevras and Sartzetakis speak for the considerable majority of all Greek people. I really do feel that overtures towards Turkey from the West from within and without the Community, unless sensitively handled, may run the risk of alienating Greece and her people from the institutions of the West.


Of course there is a balance to be struck. Militarily at least Turkey is a potential asset to the West but the balance must be struck with an eye to the size of the stakes. To alienate the Greek nation, which, with all its faults, is unequivocally on the side of the West could be a dangerously high price to pay.

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
LORD HAILSHAM'S VISHT TO ATHENS : 20 JUNE

1. THE LORD CHANCELLOR, ACCOMPANIED BY LADY HAILSHAM, VISITED ATHENS ON 20 JUNE TO REPRESENT HMG AT THE COMMEMORATION OF THE CENTENARY OF THE BRITISH SCHOOL AT ATHENS. HIS SPEECH, DELIVERED IN A MIXTURE OF ENGLISH, CLASSICAL AND MODERN GREEK, WAS A REMARKABLE 'TOUR DE FORCE' (UNDERLINED), AND A TRIBUTE TO HELLENISM WHICH BROUGHT TEARS TO THE EYES OF THE AUDIENCE, INCLUDING MELINA MERCOURI.

2. AFTER VISITING THE BRITISH COUNCIL'S OFFICE AND MEETING THE STAFF, LORD HAILSHAM PAID A COURTESY CALL ON THE SPEAKER OF THE GREEK PARLIAMENT AND UNDERLINED THE IMPORTANCE HE ATTACHED TO DEVELOPING THE PARLIAMENTARY CONTACTS BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES. HE THEN CALLED ON THE PRESIDENT OF THE HELLENIC REPUBLIC. THE TALK LASTED ONE AND A QUARTER HOURS. I HAD WARNED LORD HAILSHAM THAT SARTZETAKIS WOULD PROBABLY PLAY HIS ANTI-TURKISH GRAMOPHONE RECORD. HE DID. BUT IT WAS NOT JUST THAT. SARTZETAKIS, NUDGED BY LORD HAILSHAM, SPOKE MORE REFLECTIVELY ABOUT GREECE'S PREDICAMENT WITH TURKEY. THEY WANTED A RECOGNITION OF THE PRESENT FRONTIERS. BUT THEY WERE BEING BOMBARDED BY EXAMPLES OF TURKISH HOSTILITY. THEIR TROOPS REMAINED IN CYPRUS. GREECE FELT PART OF WESTERN EUROPE. SHE HAD A TRADITION OF FRIENDSHIP WITH BRITAIN, WITH WHOM SHE HAD FOUGHT IN TWO WORLD WARS. THE TURKS HAD REMAINED NEUTRAL, SCHEMING WITH THE GERMANS AT THE EXPENSE OF GREEK SOVEREIGNTY. GREECE COULD NOT ACCEPT COMMUNISM AND, WITH WESTERN HELP, HAD DEFEATED THE COMMUNIST ATTEMPT TO TAKE OVER AFTER THE LAST WAR. SHE HAD FOUGHT ALONGSIDE THE UNIN KOREA. SHE TOOK IT HARD THAT SOME OF HER WESTERN PARTNERS QUESTIONED HER ATTACHMENT TO THE WESTERN DEMOCRATIC ALLIANCE. HE AGREED WITH LORD HAILSHAM THAT WESTERN EUROPE NEEDED TO WORK TOGETHER TO PERSUADE THE UNITED STATES OF THE IMPORTANCE OF MAINTAINING ITS DEFENSIVE SHIELD OVER EUROPE. BUT IT WAS ESSENTIAL THAT ALL GREECE'S PARTNERS SHOULD UNDERSTAND HOW DEEPLY GREECE DISTRUSTED TURKISH INTENTIONS. THE FAILURE OF BRITAIN TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE GUARANTEE FOR CYPRUS IN 1974 HAD LEFT A SCAR. HE WELCOMED THE EFFORTS NOW BEING MADE TO DEVELOP A CLOSER AND MODERN PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN BRITAIN AND GREECE. HE AGREED WITH LORD HAILSHAM THAT GREECE HAD TO PLAY ITS PROPER PART INSIDE NATO IN PROMOTING A BETTER RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN EAST AND WEST. BUT HE APPEALED TO BRITAIN AND GREECE'S OTHER EUROPEAN PARTNERS TO HELP SAFEGUARD GREEK TERRITORIAL INTEGRITY AGAINST THE TURKISH THREAT. GREECE HAD FOR CENTURIES REPRESENTED THE

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
