PRIME MINISTER

ANGLO-FRENCH SUMMIT: 21 NOVEMBER

As you know, we try to squeeze these summits into a single day. It is going to be a bit harder with the Anglo-French summit because both the President and the Prime Minister want a share of your time. Our plan was to go over early on the Friday morning, have talks with the President (separately) and with the Prime Minister, a lunch given by the President, a plenary session, a press conference and back to London.

M. Chirac's office have now telephoned to say that he would like to invite you to stay for a working dinner. He takes the point that you want to get back to London that night, but suggests that if the dinner were at 7pm sharp you would be able to leave Paris by 9.30pm. Given the 1 hour time difference you would be back at Heathrow by 9.30pm English time and in Chequers by 10.30pm.

I have given absolutely no commitment. If you were to stay to dinner we could of course go over rather later in the morning. The worst of your mid-November speeches will be over. And it is a Friday. It is really a question of your relations with M.Chirac.

Agree to stay in Paris for an early working supper and return that evening?

ANGLO-FRENCH SUMMIT

I have seen a copy of Paris tel. no. 1057 with some highly ingenious proposals for the organisation of the Anglo-French Summit. I have not at this stage consulted the Prime Minister. But I judge she would be content with the structure proposed in paragraph 4. The only problem I foresee is with dividing the time available with President Mitterrand and M. Chirac into two distinct sessions. Given the need for interpretation, at least with President Mitterrand, this would make both meetings very short. The alternatives would be either to leave them both as tete-a-tete throughout, which would follow past precedent; or to lengthen the time available by arriving half-a-hour earlier and making lunch half an hour later so that Foreign Ministers could join for part of the time. I think that the Prime Minister would leave it to the French as hosts to state a preference.

I know that the Prime Minister's strong preference is to compress these bilateral summits into a single day. An invitation to dinner from M. Chirac would make this difficult. Let us see if the invitation does in fact materialise. I will then consult her.
