
ATP AIRCRAFT FOR GREECE

ATP AIRCRAFT FOR GREECE

Catherine Bradley wrote to you on 3 December, in response to Sir Raymond Lygo's letter of 28 November, about British Aerspace's attempts to sell their new ATP (Advanced Turboprop) aircraft to Olympic Aviation of Greece.

As you know, at our request, the Prime Minister raised this issue with the Greek Prime Minister in the margins of the EC Council Heads of State meeting in December. This contract is very important to BAe and our concern at that time was to counter strong French pressure in favour of the rival Franco-Italian ATR42 aircraft. We understand from BAe that this pressure has been intensified and that the choice of aircraft was discussed at a recent meeting between Mr Papandreou and the French Foreign Minister, leading to a report in the French press that the ATR42 would be selected instead of the ATP. However, BAe understand from their contacts that no contract has yet been signed and that the Head of Olympic Aviation is continuing to argue in favour of purchase of the ATP.

A decision is imminent, and our Ambassador in Athens recommends that a letter from the Prime Minister at this stage would be a most helpful initiative to counter French pressure. In view of the importance of this contract to BAe we would endorse the Ambassador's recommendation. Given the imminence of the decision we would recommend that the Prime Minister write as soon as possible, on the lines of the attached draft which has been cleared by FCO officials.

EXPORT CREDIT FOR GREECE

Thank you for your letter of 15 December.

As you say, if all the large deals being talked about do come to fruition then the present ECGD limit for Greece would be substantially exceeded. However such a situation does not appear very likely given the previous history of lack of demand for cover for this market and the fact that the Papandreou Government is only half way through a tight economic stabilisation programme instituted in response to a worsening economic performance in 1985. On the other hand even if, unexpectedly, a large amount of this business did become firm, I believe that an increase in the limit would not be out of the question.
