PRIME MINISTER

The Foreign Office are keen to use your visit to Moscow as a lever to open up access to the International Department of the Central Committee of the Communist Party.

They have difficulty, however, in identifying a plausible opposite number. In a sense, it ought to be Conservative Party foreign affairs experts. (The Labour Party maintain contacts with the International Department). The Foreign Secretary has concluded, however, that the Cabinet Office would be the best conduit. He recommends that we should send a delegation headed by Christopher Mallaby.

You will want to consider whether you would prefer to pursue this on a Conservative Party net: or are content for Mr. Mallaby to go.
