

Abel Aganbegyan We have been pursuing with the Russians the suggestion that Academician Aganbegyan should visit the UK this autumn and brief the Prime Minister on the progress of economic reform in the Soviet Union. The Charge d'Affaires at our Embassy saw him the other day. Aganbegyan plans to come to the UK from 18 to 28 November, following a visit to France. He has an invitation from the British Academy, who will arrange a suitable programme for him, including visits to universities, industry, meetings with economists and bankers etc. He has expressed interest in visiting some factories to discuss problems of management. This will be his first visit to England. Aganbegyan said that he would be very happy to brief the Prime Minister on perestroika; he seemed keen to give the impression that he would be doing this as an individual rather than a government emissary. We will send you before the visit a paper on the current state of the economic reform programme together with material on Aganbegyan and his work. If the Prime Minister wanted to discuss the reform programme in advance of seeing Aganbegyan, it would be easy to gather together some suitable people: for example one or more of Professors Alec Nove, Ronald Amman and Philip Hanson. If you will let us know when the Prime Minister would like to see him, we will inform the British Academy so that they can start building their programme around that. Thank you for your letter of 3 September about the arrangements for a meeting between the Prime Minister and Academician Aganbegyan.
